History of QCPD

On November 25, 1939, then Quezon City Mayor Tomas Morato organized the Quezon City Police Department and served concurrently as its Chief. It was simply a department in name, since the task of maintaining peace and order was the sole responsibility of the Philippine Constabulary.

Mayor Morato was later replaced by Hon. Sabino de Leon, who later relinquished his post to Colonel Crisano Alba. After Colonel Alba, Colonel Bibiano Viña took charge of the growing police force. After his tenure, PC Colonel Tomas B. Karingal, assumed his short stint as Quezon City Police Chief and was replaced by Colonel Bornaes. Not long after, Colonel Karingal was re-appointed as Quezon City Chief of Police.

The National Capital Region Police Office was geographically divided into four (4) Police Districts, with Central Police District covering the area of Quezon City. Col. Romeo San Diego, earning the distinction of being its first District Superintendent. The Central Police District maintained its headquarters at Camp P/Maj Gen Tomas B. Karingal in Sikatuna Village, Diliman, Quezon City.

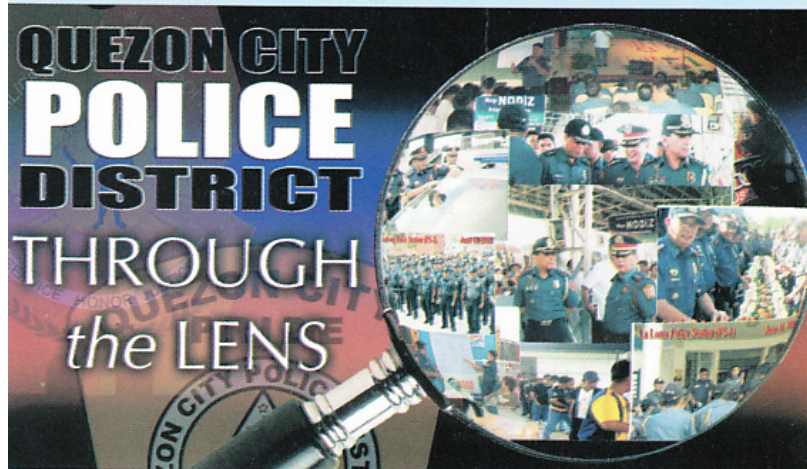
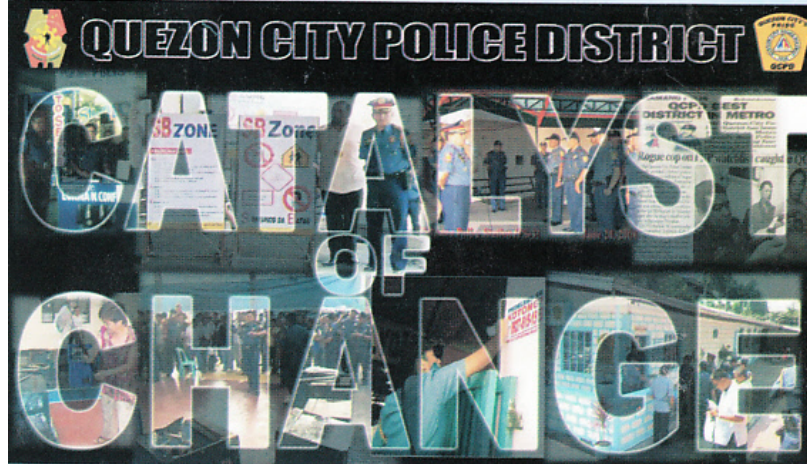
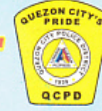

Kampo Tomas B Karingal is located at Sikatuna Village, Quezon City. The 4.9 hectare camp, lying in the western part of the vast University of the Philippines reservation, strategically lies within the center of government and commerce of Quezon City.

The camp was named after the late P/Maj Gen Tomas B Karingal, the first police general of the Integrated National Police.

The camp is seat to the QCPD's Command Group, Directorial Staff and its operating units making it the nerve center of all police operations throughout the city.

Aside from the Quezon City Police District, Kampo Karingal also houses the different district offices and units such as the BJMP Female Dormitory and the CIDG.

PNP Badge Symbolism



Philippine Monkey Eating Eagle The National Bird – symbol of swiftness and ferocity, power, courage and immortality.

PNP Shield - Symbol of protection of all citizens.

Three Stars - Stands for Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao which constitute the Republic's Territorial Integrity over which the PNP must enforce the law and maintain peace and order with professionalism, zeal and dedication in keeping with the highest ideals and traditions of service to God, Country and People.

Eight Sun Rays - Represents the eight (8) provinces whose ideals of courage, gallantry patriotism led to their revolt against Spain.

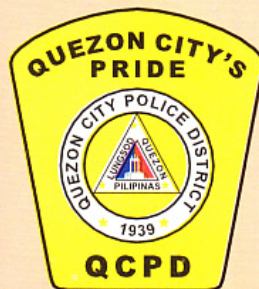
Lapu – Lapu - Symbolizes the bravery of the Philippine National Police.

Service, Honor, Justice - Service is the vibrant and cogent deeds and actions in response to the needs and wants of the people in distress: Honor could be the overriding criterion and consideration in the performance of their entrusted task or mission: and Justice dispensed to everyone whatever is due to him without favoritism or discrimination of any sort.

Laurel Leaves - Symbolizes the competency, brilliance and honor in the field of endeavor expected from each and every member of the PNP.

Philippine National Police - Identity of Solidarity.

QCPD SEAL



– the most prominent feature of the QCPD seal is the name of the police organization Quezon City Police District encircling the triangular Quezon City government seal symbolizing the mission of QCPD to serve and protect Quezon City jurisdiction, its territory and its citizens. Worn on the left shoulder of the PNP GOA uniform. The ubiquitous yellow seal is the source of pride of every QCPD policemen. The modern CDM shield, is a symbol of protection of all citizens.

PNP Seal Symbolism



Lapu-Lapu Hero - The great Filipino hero of Mactan, the prototype of the best and most noble in Filipino manhood who is the symbol and embodiment of all the genuine attributes of leadership, courage, nationalism, self-reliance and a people-based and people powered community defense. The benevolent and heroic warrior who derived added strength from a cohesive, determined and loyal people is today a fitting symbol and a

prototype as well of people power to preserve our values, customs, traditions, way of life and the rule of law thru a solidly community-based police system. Lapu-Lapu also personifies for us today civilian constitutional authority.

Laurel - Green Laurel with 14 leaves, symbolizes the 14 Regional Commands. It is also a symbol of the honor, dignity and the privilege of being a member of a noble organization where the call to public service is par excellence a commitment to public trust.

Shield - The symbol of the Philippine Constabulary, the first National Police by virtue of Organic Act No. 175, enacted by the Philippine Commission on 18 July 1901. The Philippine Constabulary for the close to 90 years of service to the nation has performed with honor, professionalism and courage. The PC has carved out a large part of the glorious pages of Philippine history, as attested by its proudly and deservedly garnering 86 of the 92 "Medals of Valor" the highest honor that a grateful Filipino nation can bestow on its gallant sons in the service of the Republic. Most appropriately therefore, the Philippine Constabulary became the nucleus of the Integrated National Police in 1975 to nurture the then embryonic concept of the nationalization of the country's local police forces.

Three Stars - Luzon, Visayas and Mindanao and the 1,700 islands and the territorial integrity wherein the National Police must enforce the law and maintain peace and order with professionalism, zeal and dedication in keeping with the highest ideals and traditions of service to our country and people.

Service • Honor • Justice - Added distinct ideals for the officers, men and women of the PNP to insure efficiency, integrity, cohesiveness, camaraderie and equanimity to enhance community acceptance and support to attain its mission of peace keeping and law enforcement.

Sun - Symbolize the flowering, maturing and ultimate realization of the glorious evolution of the PC/INP into a National Police Organization - "national in scope and civilian in character" - as enshrined in the 1986 Constitution. The Traditional light rays which represents the fightingest provinces whose ideals of courage and patriotism the members of the National Police must possess.
