Happy 8th Founding Anniversary, QCG-REA!

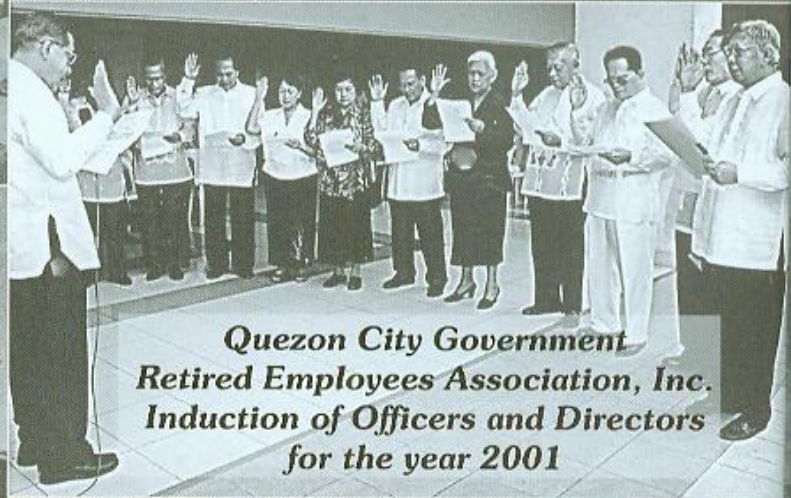

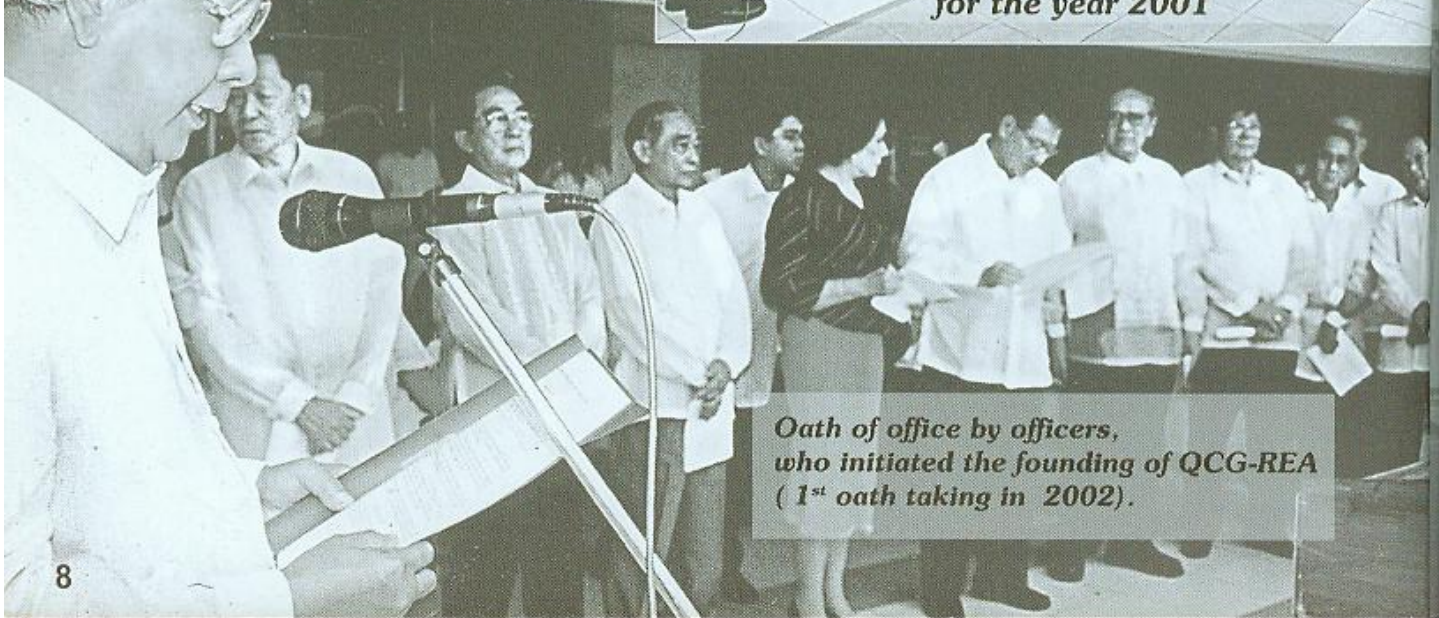

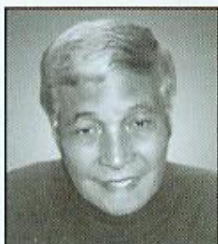

■ RETIRED BUT NOT TIRED

Yes, it is very true, all of us, the officers and the members of the Board of the **Quezon City Government Retired Employees Association, Inc. (QCG-REA)** have indeed retired from service to the Quezon City government. But honestly we are not yet tired. We are just RE-TIRED, meaning to say like an old and reliable car, we just installed new tires to attain a safe and enjoyable ride as we travel further the bumpy and rugged road still ahead of us before we finally reach the Great Divide.

For the past fifty-eight years I have continuously served the Quezon City government faithfully and honestly to the best of my ability and indeed I enjoyed

every day of it.

I started as a License Clerk at the Mayor's Office of Quezon City on July 7, 1951 with **Ignacio Santos-Diaz** (before **Amoranto**) as the City Mayor. We were only seventeen employees at the Office of the Mayor which included the Secretary to the Mayor, the Private Secretary to the Mayor, the Administrative Officer, several other clerks down to the Janitor. I was the License Clerk doing the lone job of accepting applications for a Mayor's Permit (Business Permit). I would process the application, prepare the permit then make a record and file. I did this alone until I could not anymore do it by myself such that I requested for a clerk-typist, a records and file clerk and another clerk. With the additional force, a Section was formed — the Permit and License Section under the Office of the Mayor - and I was made the Chief. I started it all — the now very big and very important Business Permit and Licensing Office (BPLO) in Quezon City Hall.

I was the BPLO Chief in 1987 until I retired to run as City Councilor for the 1st District of Quezon City. I got elected and on my second term I became the Majority Floor Leader and finished my three-term limit until 1998 (10 years). Possibly because of my very long service with BPLO (38 years) imposing fees and taxes and collecting revenues for the City government and probably also because of my ten years in the legislative body of the City government (City Council), I was prevailed upon by **Mayor Ismael A. Mathay, Jr.** to stay and further serve the City government as Consultant on Legislative and Revenue Matters from July 1, 1998 to June 30, 2001.

On July 1, 2001, **Mayor Feliciano Belmonte, Jr.** also requested me to further serve the City government again as Consultant on Legislative and Revenue Matters. Then on September 1, 2001, I was appointed Chairman of the Liquor Licensing and Regulatory Board

(LLRB). Mayor Belmonte told me that since I was the author and principal sponsor of the very ordinance of the City Council that created the LLRB in 1989, probably I am the best person to lead in the proper enforcement and compliance monitoring to the intention and purpose of the said Liquor Regulatory Ordinance. I accepted the challenge and so here I am still at Quezon City Hall as the 4th Chairman of the Liquor Licensing and Regulatory Board whose primary function is to regulate the serving, selling, manufacturing, dispensing and the consumption of intoxicating liquor including beer in all business establishments dealing in liquor from the smallest sari-sari store to the biggest amusement places and eateries in Quezon City.

Yes, we are all not yet Tired. As a matter of fact we organized the **QC Government Retired Employees Association, Inc.** on October 12, 2001. It was during that day that a handful of former department heads, chief of offices and ordinary employees who already retired after reaching the mandatory retirement age of 65 assembled at the office of **Mrs. Lourdes Lansang**, previously the City Personnel Officer, purposely to form an association of retirees. Mrs. Lansang, acting as coordinator, successfully gathered retirees like me, former Park Chief **Cesar Sianghio**, former Public Information Officer **Aniceto Lazo**, Sanitation Division Head of the Health Dept. **Alberto Felipe**, former City Secretary **Sotero Laude**, Division Head of the City Secretary's Office **Fred Foronda**, former Division Heads of the General Services Office **Ambrosio Ortega** and **Teofilo Madrid**, former BPLO Head **Patricio Dumlao**, former City Budget Officer **Estrella P. Castro**, former Taxes & License Chief of the Treasury **Mr. Mario Velasco**, former Cultural & Tourism Officer **Dominador Ocrisma**, former City Secretary Atty. **Vicente Alvarez**, former Asst.

BPLO Officer **Norma Crisostomo**, former Liaison Officer **Vicente Guerrero**, former City Electrician **Olegario Tabernilla**, **Victor Toledo** of the Cultural & Tourism Office who served as Director of the world famous Pangkat Kawayan, BOC Section Head **Jorge Canonigo** and **Dr. Wenifreda D. Agudon** of the Health Dept. We all assembled at the small office of **Mrs. Lansang** at the Office of **Vice Mayor Herbert Bautista** that very memorable day October 12, 2001, which coincided on the 62nd Foundation Day of Quezon City.

And so **QCG-REA** was formed. These retired employees and hundreds of other retirees who spent the prime years of their lives in the service to the Quezon City government played important roles in their own capacity and respective times in the formulation and implementation of major policy decisions and in shaping the direction of the City Administration. Quezon City Hall was their second home for a good many years while in the service. Upon retirement, they scattered like leaves blown by the wind. Yet impelled by the "homing instinct" they would come back to City Hall every now and then just to look around familiar places and recapture memories of the good old days. But to their dismay, they discovered that they did not even have a place to gather and they felt like strangers in the place they once called "home".

Through the **QCG-REA**, they aim to re-establish their ties of brotherhood, help one another and be of service again of course where they can, in the area of their respective expertise which have been enriched by their long experience in the service of the City government. In this area, the Honorable **Vice Mayor Herbert Bautista** then pledged support and assistance toward proper recognition and for the City government to extend due courtesy and accommodations to make the retired employees of Quezon City "at home" again at City Hall. This was the Vice Mayor's utterance when the organizers of **QCG-**

REA made their courtesy call on him immediately after the Association was formally formed. He further pledged to endorse and recommend to **Honorable Mayor Belmonte** to give his full support and assistance in return for the retirees' good intention to help the present City Administration administer good governance.

For the past eight years, **QCG-REA** was able to attain and fulfill its primary objective which is to help all retirees of the QC government in attaining recognition as former employees of the City and to secure some benefits. Foremost of the benefits is the financial assistance in the amount of **P20,000.00** to be given to the family of a deceased retiree. This is embodied under Ordinance No. SP-1186, S-2002 which I vigorously, patiently, humbly and worked so hard on the City Council using my "charisma" as a former City Councilor of the City. The ordinance was enacted on October 9, 2002 and finally approved by **Mayor Belmonte** on December 10, 2002. All of the Councilors then acted as introducers and sponsors such that a unanimous approval was attained. Very recently, acting favorably on a resolution of **QCG-REA**, the City Council considered and amended this original ordinance by increasing the financial assistance from **P20,000.00** to **P30,000.00**. We hope and pray that the Honorable City Mayor will finally approve the same considering that this will be a continuing financial assistance to employees of the City government who sooner or later will be retiring from the service.

Another benefit that the **QCG-REA** has worked out with the Quezon City General Hospital was the extension to all members of **QCG-REA** the following:


1. **Free professional services except on private contractual agreement.**
2. **20% discount on all Laboratory and X-Ray services.**

3. **20% discount on medicines from the hospital's pharmacy.**
4. **Easy access to the Administration Office for assistance.**
5. **Enjoyment of the Express Lane as provided for.**

These accommodations were embodied in the letter dated October 17, 2006 of the Director for Administration of the QC General Hospital in view of Resolution No. 2006-2 of **QCG-REA** done on July 31, 2006 which sought these forms of assistance to members of our association.

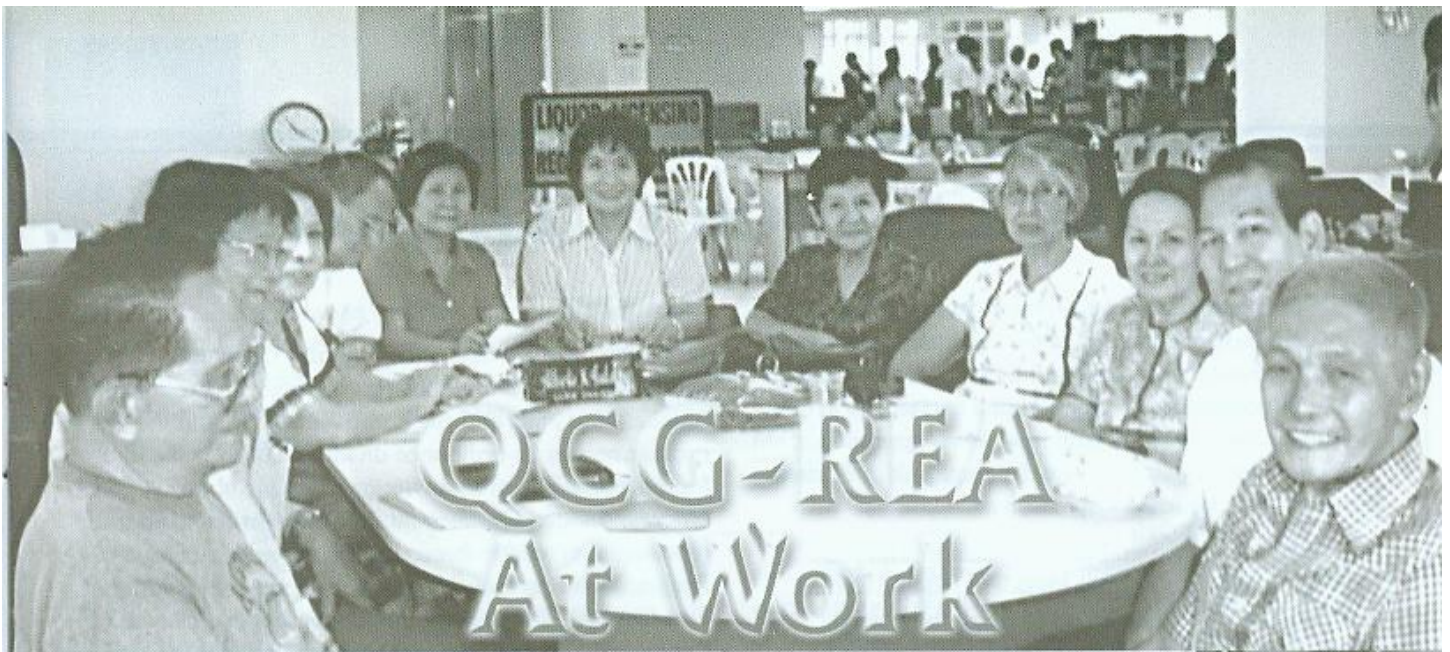

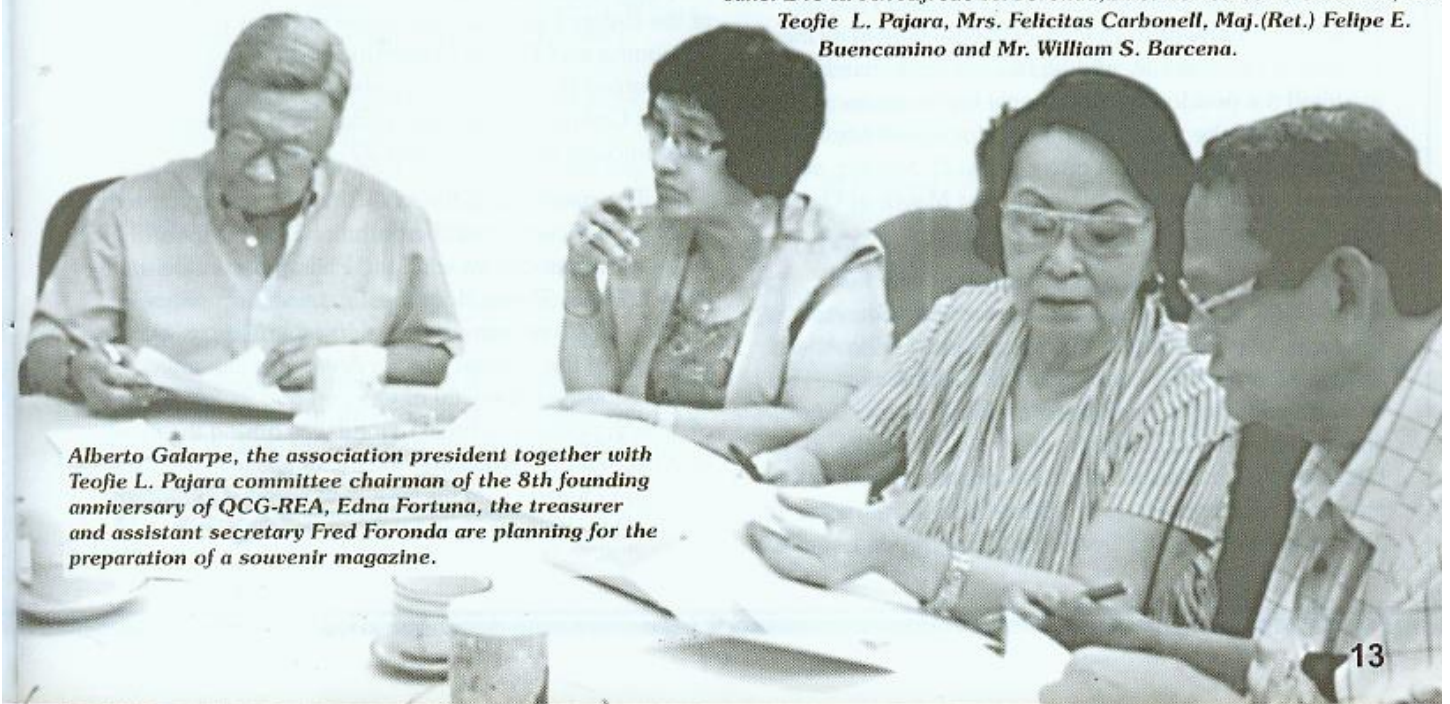

“THE CREATION OF QUEZON CITY”

On September 2, 1939, then Assemblyman Ramon P. Mitra, Sr. of the 2 District of Mountain Province stood before the National Assembly with a bill proposing the creation of a capital city in the Philippines. The bill could have been approved easily but Mitra wanted it named Balintawak or Andres Bonifacio City for historical reasons.

Two assemblymen from Pangasinan, Narciso Ramos, the father of former President Fidel V. Ramos and Eugenio Perez teamed up to delay the passage of the bill so that a more appropriate name could be selected. When the matter was brought to Malacanang, President Manuel L. Quezon called a group for reaction. Quezon preferred to have the capital city named Harrison City after the former American Governor-General of the Philippines. Another suggestion was Taft City in honor of the first Civil Governor of the Philippines. However, Don Alejandro Roces, Sr., the person closest to President Quezon, said “Let us call it Quezon City”. Quezon reacted by saying, “Why can’t you people wait until I’m dead before you name anything after me?” But the decision was unanimous for which Quezon just smiled.

And so in the afternoon of September 28, 1939 the National Assembly approved Bill No.1206 creating Quezon City. On October 12, 1939 President Quezon signed Commonwealth Act No. 502 now known as the Charter of Quezon City and he himself immediately assumed the position as Mayor only for purposes of administering the necessary matters for a new city. However, he appointed at once Tomas B. Morato, an Engineer and a close friend, as the first Mayor of Quezon City in October 23, 1939.

The first appointees as city officials were Pio Pedrosa as City Treasurer who later became Secretary of Finance; Jake Rosenthal as City Assessor; Emilio Abello as City Attorney who later became Executive Secretary; Vicente Fragante as Vice Mayor and at the same time City Engineer; Dr. Eusebio Aguilar as City Health Officer and also as City Councilor together with Jose Paez and Alejandro Roces, Sr.; Atty. Damian Jimenez as Secretary of the City Council and Sabino de Leon as

Chief of Police.

The first City Council of Quezon City was composed only of three persons namely, Dr. Eusebio Aguilar, Jose Paez and Alejandro Roces, Sr. and the first ordinance was an ordinance dividing Quezon City into four districts. The ordinance signed on October 27, 1939 officially divided Quezon City into four districts under the representation of the three councilors and Vice Mayor Fragante who previously served as Vice Mayor for the First Council. The original document read as follows: Ordinance Number 1: — An Ordinance dividing Quezon City into four districts. Section 1- For the purpose of administration, Quezon City is hereby divided into four districts to be represented by different members of the City Council, as follows: Diliman District— To embrace Diliman Estate and the Area bounded by Calle España, Daño and Salapan Rivers and the boundary of the City of Manila and to be represented by Councilor Alejandro Roces, Sr. San Francisco del Monte District — To embrace the Area north of Calle España and west of Diliman Estate, including San Francisco del Monte and Sta. Mesa Estates, to be represented by Councilor Jose Paez Mandaluyong District — To embrace those portions in the Magdalena and Mandaluyong Estates included in the City and represented by Vice Mayor Vicente Fragante University District — To embrace those portions of the Balara Filter sites and those portions of the Mariquina and Piedad Estates included in the City and represented by Councilor Eusebio D. Aguilar Section 2- This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage. Unanimously passed October 27, 1939.

The members of the said City Council continued as City Councilors until the outbreak of World War II when the Japanese invaded the Philippines in the early days of 1942. Throughout the Japanese occupation, Quezon City was non-existent. However the city became a District of the Greater Manila Area. Just like any growth however, the City of Quezon had its fair share of growth pains. The most painful was during the years of World War II particularly the Japanese invasion. As President Quezon City under a new political entity - the Greater Manila Area. Led by Executive Secretary Jorge

Vargas the Greater Manila Area was composed of the city of Manila, Quezon City, Caloocan, Pasay, San Juan, Mandaluyong, Makati and Paranaque, Mayor Morato as well as all the mayors of the other towns and cities were appointed Assistant Mayor.

As if this was not enough, then Assistant Mayor Tomas Morato was arrested by the Japanese on July 19, 1942. Morato was wrongly accused of being a part of the underground movement and was imprisoned at Fort Santiago. Morato was released however on Christmas Eve in 1942 and thereafter stayed in Baguio until the war was over. The departure of Morato resulted in the division of Quezon City into two districts. The Diliman District was headed by Florencio Cruz while the San Francisco Del Monte District was chaired by Gregorio V. Felipe. As a whole, Quezon City was then still under the Greater Manila Area. Right after the U.S. Army liberated Manila, Quezon City was placed under U.S. Military Control from February 3, 1945 to April 5, 1945. From then on until its independence in 1947, Quezon City was led by Oscar Castelo as the appointed Administrator from April 6, 1945 to September 30, 1945 and Sabino de Leon as Assistant Mayor for Quezon City of Greater Manila from October 11, 1946 to December 24 of the same year.

On April 23, 1946 a national election was held for the first time after the war. President Quezon's former Secretary of Finance Manuel A. Roxas won over incumbent President Sergio Osmeña. Immediately after the elections, President Roxas announced his intention of restoring Quezon City as a regular chartered city. On the eve of Christmas of 1946, President Roxas appointed Engr. Ponciano A. Bernardo as City Mayor probably because he was Quezon City Vice Mayor and also as City Engineer during the term of Mayor Tomas Morato from 1940 until the outbreak of the war in 1941.

When Mayor Bernardo died at the age of forty-four together with Mrs. Aurora Aragon Quezon, the wife of President Quezon, in that infamous ambush made by bandits at Bongabong, Nueva Ecija on April 28, 1949, Atty Nicanor Roxas who was then Assistant Executive Secretary of President Quirino became City Mayor

May 4, 1949 up to January 3, 1950. Later on Rizal Congressman Ignacio Santos-Diaz was appointed City Mayor January 4, 1950 - until the end of the term of Quirino in 1953. In January 11, 1954 President Ramon Magsaysay appointed Norberto S. Amoranto, a tax lawyer, as City Mayor. He was the first elected Mayor of Quezon City and was the longest serving Chief Executive of the City. However, due to poor health, Amoranto submitted his resignation to President Ferdinand Marcos after serving the city for 22 years. In his place Adelina S. Rodriguez, the wife of then Rizal Governor Isidro Rodriguez, was appointed as the new City Mayor. When Martial Law was lifted and President Marcos was dethroned as President in 1986, the new President of the Philippines, Corazon C. Aquino, appointed Brigido R. Simon, Jr. as Officer-In-charge of the City and was subsequently elected City Mayor in 1987. Simon held the city mayorship until former City Vice Mayor Ismael A. Mathay, Jr. was elected Mayor in the 1992 elections.

Feliciano Belmonte, Jr. who was a three term congressman of the 4th District of Quezon City and who later on became Speaker of the House of Representatives, was elected City Mayor over movie actor Rudy Fernandez in an election held in May 2001. He is the incumbent City Mayor after winning his second term over former Mayor Mathay in the 2004 elections.

Originally Quezon City was carved out from the province of Rizal and affected the territories of the municipalities of Caloocan, San Juan, Marikina Pasig and Mandaluyong.

Its original land area of 1,527 hectares for a low-cost housing project in Kamuning District which was then a part of the municipality of San Juan, was expanded into 7,335 hectares when the law creating it as a new city was enacted under Commonwealth Act No. 502 on October 12, 1939. Its land area was further expanded into its present size of 15,359 hectares with the passage of Republic Act No. 333 on July 17, 1948 and Republic Act No. 537 on June 1, 1950. These laws extended the city boundaries to include the eight barrios of Caloocan and the eight landed estates from nearby southwest territories making it the biggest local government in Metro Manila

in terms of land area and consequently of population. By description, Quezon City is five times bigger than the City of Manila.

The beginning of the year 2006 made Quezon City the richest city in the Philippines. With its numerous economic activities, Quezon City draws its income from the registered 70,000 business establishments paying P2,635,229,130.00 in business taxes. The city's other sources of income include real property taxes in the amount of P2,299,519,760.00; other forms of taxes amounting to P305,781,800.00; shares from the national tax collection amounting to P1,548,176,820.00; and other regulatory fees and charges. The City's total income ending December 31, 2005 amounted to Seven Billion, Three Hundred Seventy Six Million, Three Hundred Ninety One Thousand and Seven Hundred Eighty Pesos (P7,376,391,780.00).

In Metro Manila, as reported by the Department of Finance Bureau of Local Government ending December 31, 2005, Quezon City had the biggest income of P7,376,391,780.00 followed by Manila with an income of P7,119,823,858.00. Makati City came in third with an income of P6,320,342,864.75.

In terms of expenditures, the City of Manila is number one in the amount of P5,902,084,336.00. It is followed by Quezon City in the amount of P4,796,002,210.00 and thirdly by Makati City in the amount of P4,416,865,605.91. The total expenditures of Quezon City ending December 31, 2005 is P4,796,002,210.00. Therefore the excess of income over expenditures is P2,580,389,570.00.

Under Ordinance No. SP-1615, 2005 the City Council approved the annual budget of the Quezon city government for calendar year 2006 in the amount of Six Billion Two Hundred Fifty Million Pesos (P6,250,000,000.00).

Indeed Quezon City is financially sound and stable under the administration of Mayor Feliciano Belmonte. The people of Quezon City will therefore benefit from the programs for total development and enhancement of welfare and living conditions spearheaded by the government.



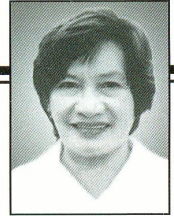

■ QUEZON CITY GOVERNANCE

(Under the Administration of Mayor Feliciano (Sonny) Belmonte, Jr.)

The term “governance” means different things to different people. It is as old as human civilization. **Governance** means: the process of decision-making and the process which decisions are implemented (or not implemented). Among the many definitions of “governance” the one that appears the most appropriate for the subject matter is “the manner in which power is exercised in the managements of a country’s economic and social resources for development. Hence the concept of governance is concerned directly with the management of the development process, involving both the public and private sectors. It encompasses the functioning and capability of the public sector, as well as the rules and institutions that create the framework for the conduct of both public and private business, including accountability for economic and financial performance, and regulatory frameworks relating to companies, corporations and partnerships **Governance**, then is about the institutional environment in which citizens among themselves and with government agencies and officials.

The capacity of this institutional environment is important for development because it helps determine the impact achieved by the economic policies adopted by the government. Although policy aspects are important for development, good governance focuses essentially on the ingredients for effective management. It is required to ensure that those policies have their desired effect. In essence, it concerns norms of behavior that help ensure that governments actually deliver to their citizens what they say they will deliver. The common features that stand put in respect of high-performing economies are stability in broad policy directions, flexibility in responding to market signals, and discipline in sticking with measures necessary for meeting long-term objectives despite short-term difficulties, all hallmarks of good governance. Public goods are those that are jointly demanded and whose consumption by one individual does not diminish their availability to others. Education and health care

are common examples of public goods. Governments assume responsibility for the provision of public goods, with fiscal resources being channeled in a preferential manner to ensure their supply. The government has the obligation to see to it that markets function efficiently, and that the playing field is level for all participants. Market regulation by the government should ensure that the operating rules do not discriminate between individuals participants or interest groups. This implies wide publicity for legislations and administrative rules and their fair and transparent application.

A key responsibility of government is ensuring that the benefits of economic growth are equitably distributed across society. Taxation and expenditure measures are prominent instruments for this purpose. While taxes should not be excessive they should be collected effectively to provide adequate revenue for essential services. The latter consideration also requires that public spending avoid excessive debt-service burdens and subsidies for low priority activities be phased out.

Good governance is required to make sure that implementation is effective and consistent thereby ensuring sustainable human development. Actions are clearly taken to work towards this ideal aim which is a reality in Quezon City under the **Belmonte Administration**.

Mayor Belmonte assumed the leadership of the Quezon City Government on July 1, 2001, and was elected for the second term in 2004. Instituting effective governance has been the focus of his administration from its first day of office.

Thus, Quezon City is one of the fastest growing metropolitan areas in the Philippines today. Recently, it joined the ranks of Hong Kong, Singapore and Taipei, as one of the top 10 Asian Cities of the Future. Consistently figuring in the top 10, and practically outranking other Philippine cities except in one category, Quezon City was assessed No. 5 in the category, “Best Economic Potential.” It was third best in Asia, in terms of “Cost Effectiveness,” sixth best, in terms of “Best Human Resources,” and tenth best, in terms of “Quality of Life.”

Mayor Feliciano Belmonte's forward-looking management style has been able to make the most of the City's strategic assets - its large and generally young population, its central location at the heart of Metro Manila, as well as the realities of Quezon City being a location of choice for media operations, schools and training center and medical facilities.

The ingredient that spelled the difference in the success of Quezon City is not just about creating programs and projects that are cost-effective but most of all it all boils down to the superb management skills of **Mayor Belmonte**, especially his mantra of "Value for every peso spent". He insists that every commodity purchased or every service rendered ought to be worth the amount the city government pays for them. He scrutinizes every minute detail of the cost of every project, every purchase for supplies and every contract of services.

Mayor Belmonte was prepared to confront the challenges when he assumed office as local chief executive. The most immediate and pressing concern, however, was where to get the money to finance the operations of the Quezon City government.

Exercising a strong political will seldom seen in most of the country's leaders, **Mayor Belmonte** did what was deemed political suicide. He did not renew the contract of over 7,000 casual employees. He was aware of the heavy political cost his decision entailed, but he did what he had to. Next, he validated and prioritized all claims for payments and systematized the program of expenditures. No renovations or improvements in the offices of the city government were made, particularly in the office of the city Mayor. If sacrifices had to be made, he made it first.

From day one of his term, **Mayor Belmonte** exercised utmost prudence in the city government's expenditures. And that made the difference. Some of the measures were designed to effectively check abuses and minimize opportunities for collusion and corruption. Others were refinements of effective collection systems.

He also streamlined the bureaucracy and computerized the operations of the most sensitive offices, particularly the assessment and collection agencies. From this focus goal came some of the most innovative and effective measures undertaken to enhance tax collection efficiency, as follows:

1. Adopted the "presumptive income level approach" (implementing a schedule of minimum gross) to make gross tax declarations more realistic and current.
2. Conducted random examinations of Books of Accounts of business firms.
3. Instructed agents of regulatory offices to conduct door-to-door, street-by-street inspection and verification of all unlicensed establishments.
4. Employed the raffle system in the assignment of revenue examiners to avoid familiarity between agents and taxpayers.
5. Offered substantial discounts to real property taxpayers paying their taxes promptly and allowed staggered payment of delinquencies upon a minimum payment of 30%, up front.
6. Sending timely and regular demand letters to delinquent taxpayers.
7. Realigned the business tax rates with those of other Metro Manila cities.
8. Put in motion the "Suyud Buwis Program" An activity that ensures that all Real Properties are assessed for taxation.

All the above-mentioned efforts and programs of the city government did not go to waste as attested by the increase in the income of the city, as of December 24, 2008 alone Quezon City boasts of a whopping 8,024,696,597.06 in revenues. This is in excess of exactly 824,696,597.06 as compared to the allotted budget of 7,200,000,000.00 for 2008.

However, the fiscal management of the city goes without condemnation by the constituents themselves. The very high tax is not pro-poor and not pro small-scale-entrepreneurs therefore encourage more tax evaders and nonpayment of fees and charges. This will again cause the city to loose income.

Taxation should not be oppressive as it is a tool for local governments to earn. It is laudable to be earning billions of pesos but not at the expense of those who want to earn a decent living. Taxation should be fair and just.

But nonetheless, the turn-around of **Quezon City** from being the "Sick Man of Metro Manila" to becoming the "**Richest City in the Philippines**" is truly one success story that every department head should be proud of as player of his working team. For me, given the chance to be a part of his administration, was a great legacy.

THE CITY BUDGET DEPARTMENT OF QUEZON CITY HOW IT CAME ABOUT AND WHY IT WAS CREATED.

The City Budget Department was created through the collective efforts of the Association of Budget Officers of Metro Manila spearheaded by its first President, **Mrs. Estrella P. Gerardo**.

Before, there was no City or Municipal Budget Office. The function of preparing the Budget is vested in the City or Municipal Treasurer. Thus, the Association of the Budget Officers in Metro Manila worked for the creation of a City Budget or Municipal Budget Office in every local government unit.

Apart from the fact that a Budget Office or Department separate from the City Treasurer is an important tool for effective management of the City or Municipal finances, the City or Municipal Mayor needs a technical staff for the preparation of his Budget particularly in Quezon City which has 140 Barangay units.

The City Budget Department of the Quezon City Government was initially created under Section 3 of Presidential Decree No. 1375 dated May 16, 1978, which provided that "Local government units shall constitute and include in their administrative organization an office x-x-x responsible for budget functions. It shall provide technical and staff services to the Chief Executive and other local officials x-x-x on budget matters. In addition, the budget officers x-x-x shall review the budgets of barangays x-x-x observing the requirements and limitations prescribed therein."

The standing of the City Budget Office was further strengthened/elevated to that of a separate and distinct department/entity under Section 475, Article Five of Republic Act No. 7160, otherwise known as "The Local Government Code of 1991."

It has thus comprehensively reviewed, analyzed and evaluated for approval of the City Mayor, the City Annual and Supplemental Budgets as well as the 140 Barangay Budgets of the Quezon City Government in accordance with all budgeting, accounting and auditing law, rules and regulations, to wit:

A. The Executive Branch:

- 18 — Regular departments
- 12 — Regular offices
- 25 — Special Projects, Task Forces, Boards, Units
- 9 — National Government Agencies (NGAs)
- 19 — Non Office Obligations
- 5 — Statutory and Mandatory Obligations

B. The Legislative Branch:

- Office of the Vice Mayor
- 6 — Special Projects
 - The City Council
 - The Secretary of the Council

Such is the rationale for the creation of a Department known as the City Budget Department.

CITY PROSECUTOR'S OFFICE

QUEZON CITY

FUNCTIONS:

Investigates and prosecutes all crimes, misdeeds and violations of penal laws and ordinances and other infractions of laws that fall within its jurisdiction;

Provides legal services, advice, assistance to party litigants relative to criminal Cases and other related matters;

Performs research works on laws, leading cases and jurisprudence relative to cases;

Conducts mediation proceedings upon directive from the Department of Justice authorities concerned;

Issuance of City Prosecutor's clearances, certifications and record checks for various purposes.

PERSONNEL AND MANPOWER:

The City Prosecutor's Office of Quezon City is composed of ninety one (91) Prosecutors under the regular plantilla items of the Department of justice headed by the Chief City Prosecutor, **Hon. Claro A. Arellano** and five (5) detailed Prosecutors, whereas, the support staff is one hundred thirty (130) including contractual employees and unfilled regular positions.

To further improve the quality of prosecutorial service we render to the public and in order to streamline and effect the smooth operation in the Office in the interest of better and speedy administration of justice, different divisions were created composed of nine (9) Divisions, the function of which to name a few is to monitor and supervise the performance of the Prosecutors under his respective division the conduct of

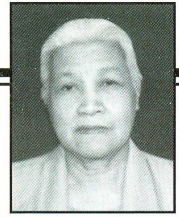
preliminary investigation and prosecution (trial) of pending cases in different Courts; to review and recommends approval/disapproval by the City Prosecutor resolutions and informations which involve the filing of cases with the Regional Trial Court and Metropolitan Trial Court; recommends approval/disapproval of pleadings related to cases and performs other related works.

The City Prosecutor's Office is tasked primarily to organize, maintain and ensure effective and efficient operational procedure of preliminary investigation and prosecution of cases involving crimes, misdemeanors and violations of city ordinances and other infractions of law falling within its jurisdiction. Investigation of cases received for preliminary investigation are terminated within forty five (45) days from receipt; prosecution of cases in Court are likewise terminated within the period specified, legal opinion on question of law or jurisprudence are also rendered and clearances, certifications and record checks are also issued for various purposes. Inquest cases are acted upon round the clock (or up to 12:00 midnight dating Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays) . Trial Prosecutors are also assigned to render Night Court for cases being handled from Monday to Friday.

The City Prosecutor's Office was formerly known as City Fiscal's Office, the first City Fiscal of Quezon City in the early 60's was **Hon. Pedro Revilla**, followed by **Hon. Justiniano Cottez**, **Sergio A.F. Apostol**, **Jose F. Erestain, Jr.** **Candido V. Rivera** and now the incumbent is **Hon. Chief City Prosecutor Claro A. Arellano**.

For those who would like to avail of the privilege to be a member, here is a piece of information for the QC government retirees. For your information, here is the association's basic sources of inspiration that this association can offer.

City Ordinance No. 1186, S-2002 was approved on October 09, 2002 by the QC government granting

financial assistance, i.e. death benefits of Twenty Thousand Pesos (P20,000.00) to the surviving legal heirs of a QC government employee upon his/her Death Benefit reserved of One Million Pesos (P1,000,000.00) provided by the QC government in its annual budget.

GUIDELINES

Implementing QC Ord. No. 1186, S-2002 (Financial Assistance for Deceased QC Government Retired Employees)

I. Policy Guidelines

It is the policy of the QC government to provide benefits to retired QC government employees who have been in the forefront in the delivery of basic public services, improvements of the quality of life and the promotion of the general welfare of the downtrodden ones who unselfishly gave their best to the public most particularly to the people of QC.

II. Financial Assistance

A reserved fund in the amount of One Million Pesos (P 1,000,000.00) to be known as QC Government Retired Employees Death Benefits Fund which is provided yearly in the annual budget of the QC government under item non-office appropriation shall be used for granting a P20,000.00 financial assistance to the surviving legal heir/s of a QC government retired employee, as authorized under the ordinance.

III. Entitlement to Financial Assistance

Surviving legal heir/s of QC government retired employee shall be eligible for the financial assistance of said retired employee, regardless of the time of his retirement, had served a minimum of five (5) years in the city. Government and died after the approval of ordinance No. 1186, S-2002 on Dec. 10, 2002.

For those who think are entitled to such benefits, it is suggested that the claimants of such financial assistance get in touch with the committee on claims at the QC Hall. c/o Mrs. Lourdes L. Lansang. ■





MY UNFORGETTABLE EXPERIENCE IN THE QUEZON CITY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Sometime in March 1957, a memo of then Honorable Mayor Norberto S. Amoranto, was circularized to all Department Heads in Quezon City Hall concerning the new settlers of Bago Bantay, which requires the immediate and appropriate action by the Quezon City Health Department.

Hundreds of low income families from Intramuros, Manila was transferred and relocated to Bago Bantay in Quezon City which poses serious problems on Hygiene and Sanitation that needs health services by the QC Health Department immediately.

Dr. Petronio G. Monsod who was the City Health Officer then designated me who is a fresh graduate in Public Health and Sanitation that was sponsored by the World Health Organization, to act as the Sanitation Officer to extend the necessary health services to all the families and new settlers in the said district and in four weeks time I was able to improve and correct the health and sanitation problems in Bago Bantay district with my approach to the

reported sanitation deficiencies obtaining in the place.

I was alone conducting house to house visitation and inspection and as such I became familiarized with the problems and needs of the new residents in the area. I personally gave them instructions and information on how to construct temporary toilets, proper wastes disposal and to go at once to the health center for any sick member of the family for treatment and obtain medical services. In this way, I explained and informed the residents that they could help the government in preventing the spread of communicable diseases and to maintain a healthy and clean community.

My environmental sanitation campaign was a success and was well accomplished such that all the concerned citizens wholeheartedly cooperated in the Health Education Program I recommended and imposed. As a freshly graduate Sanitation Officer, I considered the given task worth for emulation.





QUEZON CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT ... THEN AND NOW

The then **QUEZON CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT** started taking shape on October 12, 1939 when Commonwealth Act embodying the original charter of Quezon City was approved but became fully established on November 17, 1939 when Commonwealth President **MANUEL LUIS QUEZON** the city's first mayor designated **TOMAS B. MORATO** as the first chief of police. Originally, the police force was made up of a handful of constabulary soldiers designated as patrolmen. Next to Morato's rank was **DOMINADOR SANTOS**, who holds the distinction of being the first sergeant in the police department.

In November 1958, the QCPD launched the **CAPITOL ENFORCER** as its official mouthpiece and in its foreword written by editor, **ALFREDO G. ROSARIO**, what catches one's attention was paragraph 6 that goes...

"THE PUBLICATION OF AN ANNUAL LIKE THE ENFORCER IS, IT SEEMS TO US, MORE THAN JUST A NECESSITY. FOR IT IS NOT

MERELY A PRINTED GALLERY OF FACES, NAMES AND TITLES. MORE IMPORTANT, IT SHOULD SERVE AS A VEHICLE OF TRUTH, A MEANS OF PURVEYING THE ACTUAL FACTS ABOUT THE FUNCTIONS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE FORCE, OF INFORMING ITS READERS THAT THERE IS MORE THAN WHAT THEY HAVE BEEN SEEING IN OTHER VEHICLES OF INFORMATION".

Peace and order circa 1939 was less of a problem to the police since the city was sparsely populated with only 39,000 inhabitants. There were only two vehicles, a car for the chief of police, a station wagon for his deputy and three motorcycles for use of the so-called speed cops (motorcycle policemen). After Morato came First Lieutenant **ALFONSO TORILLO** whose term was short lived upon the appointment of Captain **SABINO DE LEON** in 1940.

From 57 the police personnel were increased to 70 near the outbreak of World War II in 1941.

After 6 years, April 1, 1947 to be

exact, President **MANUEL A. ROXAS** appointed a new chief of police in the person of Colonel **CRISANTO ALBA**, whose stint was marked by exceptional accomplishments in terms of crime solution efficiency. It was under Colonel Alba's time that four precincts were established in the districts of Cubao, La Loma, San Francisco del Monte and Galas; additional vehicles were purchased; a city jail was constructed and a photo laboratory was set up.

On March 6, 1954, Colonel Alba's term ended when the chief security of the late President **RAMON MAGSAYSAY**, Colonel **VICENTE O. NOVALES** assumed office as chief of police. It was during Colonel Novales's time that the mayoralty seat was occupied by the late **NORBERTO S. AMORANTO**, one of the most beloved mayors of the city. At about that time, members of the force was increased to 506 officers and men, a well-equipped mobile unit and 30 motor vehicles as the population of the city ballooned to 350,000 to 400,000.

On August 12, 1958, then President **CARLOS P. GARCIA** pulled out Colonel

Novales from QCPD and appointed him as member of the presidential fact-finding committee to probe anomalies in the Bureau of Customs. He was replaced by Major BIBIANO VINA who immediately made precedent-setting decisions that earned him the ire of certain city councilors for not consulting them in revamping the police department. He recalled all issued honorary badges and identification cards, exerted efforts to solve the squatter problem and grounded all speed cops using privately owned motorcycles to avoid suspicion that these cops are engaged in dubious activities. He likewise increased the number of uniformed personnel to 557.

There were others who followed Colonel Vina, notably Colonel ABENIR BORNALES, the late Major General TOMAS B. KARINGAL (who served the department for 4 terms), until President FERDINAND E. MARCOS issued Presidential Decree 421 in 1975 integrating all the city and municipal police units into one including the then Philippine Constabulary naming it as the INTEGRATED NATIONAL POLICE (INP). At about March of the same year, the city government announced the recruitment

of more than a hundred new policemen / women to beef up the dwindling number of active police personnel due to retirement, death and resignation of some members who opted to try their luck in foreign soil. So, after almost two months of rigid screening, ninety three (93) men and twenty seven (27) women, able bodied and educationally qualified applicants were sent to the then Quezon City Police Training School ideally located at the Amoranto Stadium along Roces Avenue. This group, the 24th Batch of QCPTS was the last batch of trainees under the city government because recruitment was taken over by the INP hierarchy which was then under General FIDEL V. RAMOS with General PROSPERO A. OLIVAS as the Commanding General of the Metropolitan Command (METROCOM).

Based on the decree, the thirteen (13) cities and municipalities in Metro Manila were divided into four (4) police districts.... WESTERN POLICE DISTRICT, NORTHERN POLICE DISTRICT, EASTERN POLICE DISTRICT and SOUTHERN POLICE DISTRICT.

QUEZON CITY together with CALOOCAN CITY, MALABON, NAVOTAS, VALENZUELA

(CAMANAVA) and SAN JUAN comprised the Northern Police District with TOMAS B. KARINGAL as the first Superintendent who eventually became the first police general together with Western Police District Superintendent JAMES BARBERS. Uniformed policemen were considered national government employees as they were paid by the national government and sported one uniform with the same police accoutrements. After the tragic fate of the first Superintendent in 1984, General CELESTINO ROSCA took over the reign of the district followed by General ALFREDO S. LIM (now mayor of Manila), General BENEDICTO SERRANO, General ERNESTO S. SAN DIEGO (father of P/CSupt. ELMO DG. SAN DIEGO presently the District Director), Colonel BENJAMIN O. MANLAPIG and General EDGAR DULA TORRES. In 1990, Quezon City, because of its vast jurisdiction was separated from the Northern District and like the city of Manila was declared CENTRAL POLICE DISTRICT with General ROMEO S. SAN DIEGO as its first Director who later resigned to run as vice mayor of the city in tandem with then Mayor BRIGIDO SIMON. From 1992, General RODOLFO M. GARCIA,

fresh from his stint as Regional Director of Region 3 (the first police general to have occupied the position) was chosen to fill up the vacancy.

Fast forward to the present time, the incumbent mayor, FELICIANO "SB" BELMONTE worked hard to dig into the history of the police force and coordinated with the Philippine National Police Command to be able to bring back the city's pride into its original name, the QUEZON CITY POLICE DISTRICT which was born NOVEMBER 17, 1939. Presently, the district is manned by 2,619 personnel broken down as follows:

- a. Uniformed policemen - 2,338
- b. Uniformed policewomen - 173
- c. Non-uniformed personnel - 108

To date, the QUEZON CITY POLICE DISTRICT stands tall among the five police districts in the Greater Manila area for its continuous quest in providing its citizenry with a peaceful and orderly place to live in. Why do I know all of these information? ... This contributor's father, Captain FLORENCIO N. FAJARDO was one of the 57 Commonwealth policemen circa 1940. ■

THE AMORANTO YEARS IN QUEZON CITY

I was only 22 years old when I first joined the Quezon City government on July 7, 1951.

Mayor Ignacio Santos Diaz, the father of the former head of the QC Industrial Relations Office (PESO) **Ignacio "Boy" Santos Diaz, Jr.**, appointed me as License Clerk. **Mayor**

Norberto S. Amoranto became mayor in 1954 and therefore I was ahead of him in City Hall by three years this is why I could talk about the **Amoranto** years in Quezon City. I was with him throughout his term, the years after and sadly even on the day he passed away.

In 1953 **President Elpidio Quirino** chose to run for reelection under the Liberal Party. His opponent was his own **Secretary of National Defense Ramon Magsaysay** who ran under the Nacionalista Party headed by then **Senator Jose P. Laurel** and Senate President **Eulogio "Amang" Rodriguez**. **Magsaysay's** vice-presidential running mate was then **Senator Carlos P. Garcia**. Since **Mayor Santos-Diaz** was a member of the Liberal Party, he naturally supported **Quirino** in one of the bloodiest and dirtiest national elections in Philippine history. **Magsaysay** won as President on November 10, 1953. It was a landslide victory. **Mayor Santos-Diaz** thus submitted his resignation as City Mayor of Quezon City to the new **President Ramon Magsaysay**.

When **President Magsaysay** started to look for a new mayor for Quezon City, **Senate President "Amang" Rodriguez**

recommended **Norberto S. Amoranto**, a tax lawyer and a senior tax examiner at the Bureau of Internal Revenue. When **Amoranto** took his oath as the appointed mayor of Quezon City on January 11, 1954, he pledged: "I will work hard to attain a good government for the residents of Quezon City and look after their welfare during my incumbency." All city officials from the mayor down to councilors were appointed then by Malacañang. The eight councilors appointed were: **Nicanor Ramirez, Lucas Pascual, Martin Manahan, Anacleto Madrilejo, Romulo Lucasan, Reynaldo Ermita, Felipe Cabrera** and **Benjamin Paguia**. Their salary was P4,800 per annum or P400.00 a month. The vice mayor was **Ysidro Guevarra**, an elder from Kamuning.

Mayor Amoranto was born on June 4, 1908 in a nipa house in Barrio San Jose, Biñan, Laguna. His father was a farmer and his mother sold meat in the Biñan public market. He finished

law at the Philippine Law School and continued his studies at the University of Manila for his Master of Laws degree major in taxation. One of **Amoranto's** first acts as mayor was the setting up of a Complaint and Action Center on January 19, 1954. This was an anti-graft office where residents could file their grievances against erring employees and officials of the city government. The misfits had no place in City Hall and public service was a priority. Taxation was **Amoranto's** forte and he applied it to the fullest to stabilize the city finances. His policy of "increased collection without increased taxation" motivated the residents to make correct payments. His programs for good governance inspired me to become the first Permit and License Section Chief in 1955.

With the money coming from taxes, construction in the city began to boom. Schoolhouses were built and renovated like the Quezon City High School, San Francisco High School and many others.

His primary wish, however was to construct and established a new City Hall and a City General Hospital. In 1957 when **Carlos P. Garcia** ran for president, **Amoranto** worked and campaigned hard to make him by a comfortable margin in Quezon City. After the election he requested **President Garcia** the allocation of a twelve-hectare property bounded by East Avenue and Elliptical Road facing the Quezon Memorial Circle for the site of the New Quezon City Hall.

The employees of Quezon City Hall rejoiced when the cornerstone for the site of a new City Hall building was laid on December 20, 1957. The new City Hall was finished with a total cost of only eighteen million pesos in 1972. With fourteen floors it was the tallest structure in Quezon City during that time. It took eight years, however, to finish the construction because **Mayor Amoranto** did not secure any loan for the project. The construction of the new city hall was done on a "pay as we go" basis. After that, he was

not contented with just a new city hall. He pursued the allocation of another big tract of land from the National Housing Authority (NHA) as a housing project for City Hall employees. It is for that reason why most of the houses and lots behind City Hall and the Heart Center were owned by employees of Quezon City Hall.

On September 1, 1966, **Mayor Amoranto** succeeded in negotiating for the purchase of the San Jose Seminary located in a 14.7-hectare land with buildings owned by the Jesuit Fathers in Barangay Bahay Toro. It cost the city seven million pesos only. The owners consented to be paid by installment with the condition that the property shall be converted and utilized only as the city's general hospital. The city government finally completed the payment in full after five years of "paiyakan." The initial payment was two million pesos and the remaining five million pesos was paid in five years by installment at one million pesos a year. The idea of

establishing a city general hospital was conceived in 1963 by Mayor Amorato but it was only in 1968 that his dream was realized. This was done when Ordinance No. 755, S-1968 was approved by the City Council appropriating P110,962.00 for operation and maintenance expenses and P271,620.00 for the salaries of seventy-three personnel for the hospital.

Another project that **Mayor Amoranto** was able to achieve in spite of the city's very limited resources is the now famous Amoranto Stadium. It is here where sports, big NGO gatherings, civic, social and business group activities and also rock festivals are held.

After the completion of the City Hall, the Business Permits and Licensing Office (BPLO) which I headed then was given the best place in city hall. It is located on the ground floor fronting the quadrangle where activities are being held. Atop my office on the second floor was where **Mayor Amoranto** held office. From time to time he would

come to my office to check whether his program of serving well the city taxpayers was being observed properly. His office was furnished well with a huge narra desk with exquisite carvings. Most of the time, though, **Mayor Amoranto** held office not there but in a tiny corner beside the conference room at the back portion of the office. Ever since he became mayor, his office was open to anybody who would like to see him. There were no secretaries to pass through and therefore the room was always filled with so many people seeking audience with him for official, personal and social favors.

In 1973 BPLO granted 27,000 business permits for establishments to operate in Quezon City. There are now almost 100,000 firms operating in the city. To establish a business center, **Mayor Amoranto** enticed **Don Amado Araneta** who owned a big tract of land and an undeveloped property in Cubao to build commercial buildings and to establish an amusement center. That

undeveloped property bounded by EDSA and Aurora Boulevard was a residential area where such kind of business activity was prohibited. **Don Amado Araneta**, however, relied on building permits personally issued by **Mayor Amoranto** handwritten by him on napkins while meeting with **Mr. Araneta** in a restaurant. Soon, the Araneta Coliseum was built and the place became the city's business center now known as the Araneta Center. A first-class theater, the New Frontier Theater, was built. Later on the first McDonald's outlet in the country was established as well as the first Jollibee near Araneta Coliseum. These were followed by Rustan's Department Store, Ali Mall, Farmers Market, COD Department Store and many others. Quezon City then really started to grow.

The political life of **Mayor Amoranto** was indeed very colorful. The first election in Quezon City was held on November 10, 1959. **Mayor Amoranto** became the first elected mayor. He won over

former **Mayor Ignacio Santos-Diaz** of the Liberal Party. Elected Vice Mayor was **Col. Vicente O. Novales** who was the city's chief of police before the elections. The eight city councilors elected were: **Justice Pedro Tuazon** who was the former Secretary of Justice under the Citizens League for Good Government; **Dr. Vidal A. Tan**, former UP president; **Dean Conrado Benitez**, former UP dean and one of the drafters of the 1935 Constitution; **Ambassador Proceso Sebastian**, former senator and ambassador to the Vatican; **Capt. Carlos Albert**, a former navy captain and chief of the AFP intelligence unit; **Dr. Victoriano Diamonon**, a college professor and former member of the Philippine delegation to the United Nations; **Atty. Jose G. Narcelles**, an independent candidate and former administrative officer of the QC Mayor's Office; and **Dr. Anastacio Yabut** of the Nacionalista Party, a well-known medical practitioner from Kamuning.

The second election was held in November 1963. **Mayor Amoranto** ran for reelection and won handily. His opponent was his vice mayor, **Vicente Novales**. When **Amoranto** suffered a stroke on January 20, 1961, his Vice-Mayor then (**Novales**) assumed the mayorship. During that time **Novales** worked closely with the Citizens Leaguers which probably was the reason why he was inspired to run against **Amoranto**. The **Novales** line-up in that election was composed of Citizens Leaguers with **Dr. Vidal Tan** as his running mate and all the incumbent councilors under the Citizens League.

But the Quezon City voters selected the underdog **Amoranto** who just recovered from a stroke. His running mate was a lawyer and a college professor from University of the East, **Atty. Mariano Sta. Romana**, who was my neighbor in Project 8 in Barangay Bahay Toro. He was a greenhorn in politics but he beat former U.P. president **Dr. Vidal Tan** for the vice mayoralty post

since the **Amoranto** camp almost got elected totally. Six Nacionalista councilors topped the eight council seats, all **Amoranto** men. They were **Eduardo T. Paredes, Rafael Mison, Jr., Saturnino Bermudez, Romulo A. Lucasan, Florentino Lapus** and **Luisa Orendain**. The tailenders were the two incumbent councilors under the Citizens League, **Dean Conrado Benitez** and **Ambassador Proceso Sebastian**.

The third election was held in November 1967 and **Amoranto** won again against former Councilor and **Navy Captain Carlos Albert**. A young and eager politician by the name of **Ismael A. Mathay, Jr.** came into the picture in the group of **Mayor Amoranto** and was elected vice mayor. There were sixteen councilors elected from a previous eight. Among the sixteen new councilors were three businessmen, three lawyers, two security men, one media man, one person from the civic sector and five personalities from the movie world, namely, **Fred Montilla, Mario Montenegro,**

Ka Tinno Lapus, Ronald Remy Kookooritschkin and **Pepito Vera Perez**.

The fourth election was held November in 1972. Again, **Amoranto** won and this time with **Navy captain Carlos Albert** as his vice mayor who, after losing a fight against **Amoranto** in the 1967 elections, joined him in this election. **Vice Mayor Ismael A. Mathay, Jr.**, who won as such with the **Amoranto** camp in the 1967 election, ran against **Amoranto** as the Malacanang (**Marcos**) candidate and therefore lost.

On September 21, 1972, **Marcos** declared martial law under Proclamation No. 1081 such that there was no more election. In March 1976, Marcos appointed **Mrs. Adelina S. Rodriguez**, the wife of Rizal **Governor Isidro Rodriguez**, as mayor of Quezon City.

Because **Mayor Amoranto** loved Quezon City Hall so much that even after his term, he continued to jog around the city hall area every morning at six a.m. with close

friends. One Saturday morning, on December 22, 1979 at about eight in the morning, **Mayor Amoranto** felt a stabbing pain in his chest. We rushed him to the nearby Heart Center but it was too late. Indeed he chose to pass away right in the morning shadows of that City Hall building which was the heart of his 22 years of service to the Quezon City government.

Indeed, I could say, I was with him from his first day in office on January 19, 1954 up to his last day on earth. Quezon City lost a man so dearly loved by the common man three days before Christmas on December 22, 1979.

These events happened fifty-five years ago. It is political history which the young people of Quezon City deserve to know. May we all be proud to consider **Mayor Norberto S. Amoranto** as a distinct part of Quezon City's history.
