

# STATE OF THE CITY ADDRESS

(Editor's Note. Unlike in previous years we had nothing to do with this year's thrice postponed State of the City Address of the Mayor. We have to tell this in order that credit — or discredit — for its preparation may be given to whom it is due and not to us. We understand the address was prepared by the Office of the City Administrator which sent the first draft to the Public Affairs and Information Services Office under Dr. Aniceto Q. Lazo which rehashed said first draft. The rehashed draft was then sent to the different department heads and chiefs of offices for their comments and correction. We understand it was the comments and corrections of Mrs. Veronica A. Ramos, Assistant Secretary to the Mayor, which improved the rehashed draft considerably.

The address is fairly well-written although some accomplishments are treated too skimpy contrary to the statement the Mayor is made to say: "All these (accomplishments) I shall report to you in detail." Also, many significant accomplishments have been overlooked such as the year-long prayer rally for peace and unity in the 140 barangays in Quezon City which ended in March last year. We consider this a very important accomplishment because the Mayor has been saying that the physical development of the city and the spiritual upliftment of the citizenry should go hand in hand. Another important accomplishment about which practically nothing is said are the dismantling and relocation operations of the QC Task Force on the Prevention and Resettlement of Squatters.

To complement the State of the City Address, we are also publishing the Mayor's speech (on this page) before the "Group IV Barangay Movement" which gives even a better picture of the state of the city because, with the use of comparative statistics, the Mayor enables the hearer or reader "to visualize the extent and nature of the accomplishments of (her) administration during the almost 10 years of her incumbency."

Once again I have invited you to come and hear my report on the achievements of the city government during the past year. Thank you for coming. Please bear with me as I render this report as quickly and briefly as possible, not to tax you too much.

Problems we encountered. But we were not daunted by them. Instead, we earnestly resolved to overcome them. For like Quezon, the founder of our beloved city, we chose to stand "like the molave," sturdy and resilient in the wind. In the end, we turned adversities into opportunities.

## Marcos Approves P85 M For QC Squatters

Calling it an advance "Valente Gift," for the people of Quezon City, President Marcos, in his speech during the KBL rally held last Jan. 22 in front of the Quezon Memorial Circle, approved an NHA allocation of P85 million for the acquisition of homelots for squatter residents of Barangays Commonwealth, Payatas, Batasan Hills, Holy Spirit, Libis, Tatalon, Vicente Madrigal Estate, and others.

With respect to Barangay Krus Na Ligas, which has been donated by the University of the Philippines to the city government, the President said that he will approve the donation. Krus Na Ligas, which has an area of 18.5 hectares occupied by about 300 houses, is older than U.P. When Mayor Rodriguez assumed office in 1976, the city government took over the development (Turn To Page 2)

## To Push Through This Year Housing Project For Employees

Mayor Adelina S. Rodriguez said in her State of the City Address this morning that while the timetable for the housing project for QC employees has been disrupted by unforeseen circumstances, the city government is determined to push the project through this year.

This announcement was the only part of the hour-long address of the Mayor that was met with thunderous applause.

The Mayor said that she had already instructed the City Treasurer to set aside the necessary funds for the project. Under the proposed terms in the contract the city government has entered into with the subdivision developer, it will advance the sum of P9 million as its equity for the project. This equity will be charged against employees who will buy the units — 900 units in the first phase of the subdivision.

## QC averts deficit, realizes surplus

(Editor's Note: This is reprinted from BULLETIN TODAY, January 28, 1986. The first paragraph is not correct. The Mayor did not mention the averted deficit in her State of the City Address. The BT reporter obviously got hold of a copy of our previous issue in which we had this headline: "Expected Shortfall In City's Income Averted, Substantial Surplus Instead."

The Quezon City government has averted an expected income deficit of P31 million for 1985 and instead realized a surplus of more than P20 million.

QC Mayor Adelina S. Rodriguez revealed this yesterday in her state of the city address before some 3,000 city hall employees and barangay and civic leaders.

Despite great odds caused by the economic crisis, Rodriguez said, the city government was able to maintain its long-time record of financial stability.

Metro Manila Gov. Ismael Mathay Jr., in a meeting with some 200 presidents of various QC homeowners associations last night, said QC has remained the most financially sound local government in Metro Manila.

Because of the mayor's excellent handling of the city's finances, Mathay said, "Quezon City has one of the best road networks, if not the best, not only

in Metro Manila but throughout the country."

Rodriguez said that "in spite of the suspension (early this year) of the revised assessment of real properties called for under PD 464 and the suspension of the increased rates of market fees provided for in the Metro Manila Market Code, our actual income for the year 1985 was P469.72 million, five percent greater than we had estimated."

Rodriguez said the boost in the city's income was brought about by "efficient tax collection, sound financial utilization and management, the participation of the barangay and the tax consciousness of our citizens."

In another development, Rodriguez the other night administered the oath of allegiance of some 1,000 former opposition barangay leaders from the Galas district of Quezon City who recently defected to the KBL.

Then U.P. President O.D. Corpuz succeeded in convincing the U.P. regents to donate the barangay to the city government but Corpuz ceased to be U.P. president before the donation could be implemented. The Mayor renewed the appeal for the donation in a letter, dated Nov. 28, 1983, to Corpuz's successor, Atty. Edgardo Angara, who, however, sat on the appeal. In May 1985, it was learned that, instead of to the city government, Kruz Na Ligas was to be donated to the National Housing Authority. Whereupon, Mayor Rodriguez, in a letter dated April 19, 1985, informed NHA Manager Gaudencio Tobias that it "was in consonance with the desire of the residents of Kruz Na Ligas that the barangay be donated to the city government which will allocate the lots to the residents and develop the barangay." To-

bias interposed no objection.

In his speech, President Marcos chided Cory Aquino for her ignorance of the law as manifested in her statement that she would use Amendment No. 6 to reorganize the government. Mr. Marcos said that to revamp the government, the Reorganization Act is sufficient, that, in fact, he has been reorganizing the government under this act.

Vice Governor Ismael Mathay, Jr., who introduced the President, cited the Marcos infrastructure program which opened up undeveloped portions of Quezon City. Mathay mentioned the huge highway linking QC proper with Tandang Sora and the improvement of Visayas Ave. leading to new subdivisions in the area. He cited the concreting of EDSA from end to end, doing away with old asphalted portions which used to sprout potholes during the rainy season.

quate delivery of the public services and facilities necessary to meet the 11 basic needs of man. I would also like to stress that all these accomplishments have been made possible by the assistance and cooperation of all sectors of society in Quezon City, including civic-spirited citizens like the barangay leaders and barangay captains who are members of the "Group of IV Barangay Movement."

As of today, I have been in office for the last 9 years, 7 months, and 8 days, more or less. To enable you to visualize the extent and nature of the accomplishments of our administration during this period, may I now give you the following comparative statistics:

Since funds are indispensable in any undertaking, I will start with comparative statistics on the income of the city government. In 1976, when I assumed office, the total income of the city government was P87,132,205.43 for both general and infrastructure funds. The estimated income this year is P447,161,171.00. That means a total increase of P360,028,965.57, quite an amount, I'm sure you will agree.

The bulk of the city government's income comes from real property taxes. The total taxable valuation of real properties in Quezon City has increased from P2,981,948,620 in 1976 to P9,295,519,220 as of September this year for a total increase of P6,313,570,600, an amount not to be sniffed at, I'm sure you'll again agree. Much of the increase has been brought about by the ongoing tax mapping operations of the Office of the City Assessor which was started in 1982. These operations have resulted in the discovery of undeclared or misdeclared real properties.

The Office of the City Treasurer has also been conducting an unrelenting tax collection drive which includes twice-a-year auction sale of delinquent real properties in Quezon City. The city government's income is still inadequate to fund all developmental projects but our expenditures are in accordance with priorities we have set which include all urgent and essential public services and facilities. We have never incurred a deficit in these expenditures. This has been achieved by the judicious management of available resources and the adoption of fiscal restraint measures. In Metro Manila, Quezon City can boast of having the soundest and most stable fiscal position. It is the only city/town that has been punctually remitting its 20% contribution to the MMC. In fact the MMC sometimes obtains a loan from the city.

Major accomplishments come under our Infrastructure Development Program. We are building and maintaining an adequate and rational network of roads that enhances mobility, especially to commercial, industrial, and institutional areas. We have a total number of 1,524 city streets with a total length of 735.21 km. These do not include the national roads like EDSA, Quirino Highway, E. Rodriguez Ave., Aurora Boulevard, and Quezon Avenue. In 1976, of the 735.21 km of city streets, 28.92 km. were cemented while 549.48 km were asphalted. In 1977, a year after I assumed office, we started a massive concreting and asphaltting program. This year we now have 44.66 km of asphalted streets, 120.06 km more than that of 1976. Our cementing and asphaltting program has been slowed down however by the escalating cost of road construction materials. Even our road maintenance program may be adversely affected by the reduction of the national aid to our Infrastructure Fund. This is a pity because no less than Minister of Public Works and Highways Jesus Hipolito in a TV interview last February said that "Quezon City has the best maintained roads in Metro Manila." The Engineering Department is trying its best to maintain Minister Hipolito's high assessment of the condition of our roads. It now costs about P22,000 to repair and maintain one kilometer of road.

Ninety percent (90%) of the city's built-up areas are served by the Metropolitan Waterworks and Sewerage System (MWSS) while 10% have private water systems, particularly the housing subdivisions. In the areas not served by the MWSS, the city government has installed public faucets, artesian wells, and deepwells. Under our Barangay Development Program, the Sta Lucia Waterworks System was constructed as a joint project of the Metropolitan Manila Commission and the city government at a cost of P1,800,000. On May 12, 1982, the First Lady and I inaugurated the first phase of the Novaliches Waterworks involving 35 kilometers of water pipelines which, for the first time, supplied water from the La Mesa Dam direct to the house of the residents of Novaliches proper and the surrounding barangays of Gulod, Bagbag, and San Bartolome consisting of 10,271 families.

Sports and recreation being one of the 11 basic needs, we are constantly improving and maintaining about 60 parks and playgrounds the best and biggest of them being the Jordan Heights at Barangay Damong Maliit, Dapitan Park at Barangay Sta. Teresita, U.P. Village Park at Barangay U.P. Village, Teresa Heights at Barangay Pasong Putik, and Galas Park in Galas District. We have also improved the Amarento Stadium which has an oval for track and field events and baseball and soccer games and an Olympic-sized swimming pool. Basketball courts have been constructed in various barangays to prevent the youths from improvising the streets as basketball courts. We are implementing a Sports and Physical Fitness Development Program which is premised on the UNESCO enunciated principle that the right of citizens to participate in sports, recreation and physical fitness activities is in the same category as their right for adequate food, shelter, clothing, medical care and other basic needs. Sports and recreational facilities belonging to the private sector are the world-famous Araneta Coliseum, the La Loma Cockpit, the Velodrome, 8 Bowlodromes, 25 movie houses, 4 public tennis courts, 4 public pelota courts, and 7 Sports Centers, foremost of which is this venue of today's forum.

Of the nine government-owned public markets, three of them—Galas, Frisco, and Kamuning markets—have new buildings while the six others have been repaired or renovated. Cleanliness and sanitation in these markets is encouraged by the holding of annual "Cleanest Market" contest. To free the market vendors from the clutches of users, the so-called 6 operators, Credit Cooperatives have been organized in 8 markets. Each Cooperative is given a loan of P50,000 payable in one year without interest. With interest free capital, the vendors are able to reduce their prices.

Medical statisticians say that the most sensitive index of the state of public health is the infant mortality rate. Why, I suppose, it is not for us laymen to question. In any case, based on this index, the state of public health in Quezon City has improved greatly since 1976 when the infant mortality rate was 60.7 per 1,000 population which is much higher than this year's infant mortality rate of 44.15 per 1,000 population.

The expansion of our public health services is reflected by the increase in the number of Health Centers, from 35 in 1976 to 47 this year, an increase of 12 Health Centers. The Kamuning Health Center is one of the four People's Centers in Metro Manila which the First Lady inaugurated last Nov. 7 on the occasion of the 10th anniversary of the MMC. For the current year, two more Health Centers are planned for construction at Barangays Toro Hills and Nagkakaisang Nayon costing P712,000.00. The sum of P755,666.00 has also been allocated for the repair of 15 Health Centers throughout the city.

We are expanding and intensifying existing health programs on Nutrition, Urban Primary Health Care. Under Six Clinics, Mobile

Clinics, Population Outreach, Immunization, Herbal Medicine, Control of Sexually Transmitted Disease (STD), Adolescent Fertility Clinics, Maternal and Child Health, and Communicable Disease Control, and Intervention and Referral Centers for Drug Dependents.

In 1981, the Quezon City Anti-Drug Abuse Council was created with Vice Mayor Stephen Sarino as Action Officer and myself as Chairman. The Council has been pursuing a drug abuse prevention and control program covering four major areas of concern, namely:

1) Prevention education, community information, training and research 2) Intervention and Referrals, treatment, rehabilitation, follow-up and after-care 3) Enhancement of recreational, cultural and livelihood program, and 4) Legislation and law enforcement.

The bed capacity of the Quezon City General Hospital increased from 150 in 1976 to 250 in 1982, which is still its present bed capacity. Improvements in the physical facilities of the hospital under our administration are as follows:

New Out-Patient Department, Nutrition Rehabilitation Ward, Pediatrics Ward, Emergency Room Complex, New Barangay Ward, Dangerous Drug Dependency Ward, New Nursery Ward, New Obstetrics-Gynecology Ward, Hearing Center, Morgue, Water Tank, and others.

There is a plan to convert the hospital into a University Medical Center with a 350-bed capacity and with facilities for medical research and study.

As to Day Care Centers for pre-schoolers, there were only 10 in 1976. There are now 30 of them, 11 of which are sponsored by private organizations.

Under our administration, educational services have been expanded. The number of public elementary school building has increased from 302 in 1976 with a total enrolment of 93,566 to 442 this year with a total enrolment of 132,857. The increase in the number of school buildings is 140 while in enrolment the increase is 39,291. For public secondary schools, total number in 1976 was 81 with a total enrolment of 42,692. This increased to 139 buildings this year with a total enrolment of 66,074. The increase in the number of school buildings is 58 while in enrolment the increase is 23,382.

Activities indicating the upgrading of education services under the present administration are as follows:

- 1) Intensification of the testing program in both elementary and secondary school levels, cost of printing of test materials shouldered by the city government.
- 2) Youth achievement awards co-sponsored by the City Schools and the city government.
- 3) Division athletic meets funded by the city government
- 4) Sariling-Sikap program and food production provided with seed capital
- 5) Search for Outstanding School Administrators and Teachers undertaken in cooperation with the local Jaycerettes.
- 6) Staff development programs funded by the city government
- 7) Vocational training for out-of-school youths, adult education for senior citizens, special classes for the gifted and talented as well as for the retarded, special projects on art and music, young writers contests, art hobby clubs and art centers in various elementary schools.

Our secondary school teachers are not as restive as their counterparts in other towns and cities of Metro Manila. While we were not able to grant all their demands, they were reasonable enough to understand that our inability was caused by insufficient funds and not to the lack of merit of their demands. They are quite content with the basic salaries and fringe benefits we have granted them, as follows:

 Secondary School Teacher 9 — 16,860 p.a. or (P1,405.00) monthly  
 Secondary School Teacher 8 — 15,264.00 p.a. or (P1,272.00) monthly

 Clothing allowance (1/2 City) (1/2 SEF) — P1,200 p.a.  
 Cost of Living Allowance (SEF) — 400 monthly  
 Emergency Cost of Living Allowance (City) — 350 monthly  
 Longevity Pay (City) — P10.00/5 years  
 13th month Pay (City) — 1 month basic pay  
 Rice Allowance (City) — 1 Sack of Rice  
 Even elementary school teachers who are paid by the national government have been extended financial assistance, as follows:

- SEF Salary Counterpart — P200 monthly  
 Clothing Allowance (SEF) — 950 p.a.  
 Cost of Living Allowance (SEF) — 400 monthly

Due to the prevailing economic crisis, we have given high priority to giving assistance to residents in putting up livelihood enterprises. In accordance with the First Lady's directive, we have extended loans under the KKK and Sariling Sikap programs to the "poorest of the poor". We have undertaken swine dispersal projects to help those who want to start a piggery. In a 2.5-hectare site, we have established a Kabuhayan Technological Center where agro-industrial pilot modules have been put up to serve as models for KKK participants and to supply them with planting materials and breeding stock. Quezon City is participating in the massive food production drive dubbed the Greening of Metro Manila launched by the First Lady on her last birthday.

In 1980, we launched a Manpower Development Program for out-of-school youths and unemployed adults. Various vocational courses were given in the barangays from which 6,622 have already graduated.

There is no hiding the fact that a serious housing shortage still exists in Quezon City giving rise to squatter colonies and skyhigh house rentals. This housing shortage exists despite the 8 housing projects of the PHHC (now National Housing Authority) in Quezon City 3 BLISS projects consisting of 800 units and about 500 housing subdivisions. The city government under its Comprehensive Development Program has an Integrated Development Program on Housing but, for lack of funds, has not been able to implement it. We have, however, a housing project for city government personnel which is in the process of being implemented. The city government has already awarded to Hennessy Construction Co. the right to undertake the project. As soon as Hennessy submits the required documents, a contract with the city government will be prepared and submitted to me for approval. Hennessy has come up with documents showing that he has purchased for 2.66 million pesos an 18-hectare land on Consitution Hill near the Batasan as the site of the subdivision. The first phase of the subdivision will consist of 900 housing units. The city government will advance the sum of P9 million as its equity for the project. The equity will be charged against employees who will buy the units.

The squatter problem remains one of the biggest headaches of the city government. Relentless efforts have been undertaken to resettle existing squatters but are of little avail because of the unabated influx of new squatters. Since 1978 up to October this year, about 8,000 squatter families have been relocated to either Bagong Silang Sites and Services (Caloocan City), Sapang Palay (San Jose, Bulacan),

Bagong Nayon (Antipolo), Dasmariñas (Cavite), or Silang (Cavite). These relocations involved the dismantling of some 6,600 structures.

In 1983, the MMC and the NHA jointly issued a Manual of Policies and Procedures on squatter prevention and control. As required by this Manual, I issued Executive Order No. 1 in 1983 creating a Task Force on Squatter Prevention and Resettlement. Since its creation, 27,298 squatter families have been censused and 16,710 structures tagged for feature relocation and dismantling, respectively.

In April 1984, we launched the "Accelerated Settlements Redevelopment Program" in response to instructions of Vice Governor Ismael Mathay, Jr. that a study be made on the development of depressed areas. Under this program, we have placed 23 depressed areas occupied by 6,754 families while six others occupied by 2,148 families are under study for inclusion.

Under this program we have adopted what we call the "Intercessionist" approach, whereby we enter into negotiations with the owners of the squatter-occupied lands with the end in view of persuading them to sell the lots to the actual occupants. The city government and the Samahang San Martin de Porres, on one hand and the Araneta Institute Corporation, landowner, on the other hand, have already entered into an agreement over the sale of the land to the members of the Samahang and the development to be undertaken.

Likewise, the city government has successfully initiated and mediated in the negotiation over another private property in Barangay Baesa owned by Alejandro Lim and occupied by some 40 families.

Presently, subdivision surveys are being conducted at the 15.4 hectare city property in Barangay Bagong Silangan and at the 4.5 hectare PUD site in Barangay Escopa with the technical services of the Bureau of Lands.

Physical development of San Martin de Porres and Capri has been completed with the NHA as the lead implementing agency. The former has a land area of 4.25 hectares benefitting some 600 families while the latter, with a land area of 9.14 hectares, is expected to generate lots for 1,134 families.

I believe I have given you an overall view of the progress Quezon City has achieved through the foregoing accomplishments under our administration. It is my hope that you find our performance satisfactory enough.

## STATE . . .

Towards this end, we have accelerated our development objectives in order to foster self-reliance and entrepreneurial growth among our people.

In consonance with our development goals and objectives, we worked out a balanced programming of our budgetary needs. Of the city's P447.2 million estimated income for calendar year 1985, we allocated our financial resources as follows: 21.65 percent for social improvements, 14.64 percent for inter-government aids, 22.41 percent for economic development, 14.59 percent for general administration, 11.45 percent for protective services, and 15.26 percent for government finance, adjudication, loans and advances, operation of economic enterprises and capital outlays.

In spite of the suspension of the revised assessment of real properties called for under P.D. 464 and the suspension of the increased rates of market fees provided for in the Metro Manila Market Code, our actual income for the year 1985 was P469.72 million, 5.0 percent greater than we had estimated.

The upsurge in our financial capability was the fruit of our efficient tax collection system, sound financial utilization and management, participation of the barangays and the tax-consciousness of our citizens.

It is worthy to note that the city assessment office in its tax-mapping operations discovered many undeclared and unassessed land and/or improvements. Since the inception of the program, a total of 6,449 parcels of land with improvements have been assessed, their valuation totalling P460.88 million or an equivalent of P16.44 million in collectible back taxes.

All in all, the newly-discovered undeclared and unassessed land and/or improvements consisting of 14,301 parcels with a total area of 551.03 hectares, have an assessed value of P863 million. The influx of new business establishments in the city, despite economic constraints, have also bolstered our present financial status.

In the continuing inventory of city properties, the city government has retrieved 4,662.41 square meters of open spaces with an estimated value of P249.85 million.

Because of our sound financial status and technical competence, we have been able to deliver efficient public services and implemented developmental projects for our citizens, especially those in the depressed areas.

All these I shall report to you in detail.

#### Infrastructure Development Programs

To enhance mobility in the city, we completed during the period under review, the construction and improvement of 47 concrete and asphalt roads, and provided 20 streets with asphalt overlay — all of which cost the total amount of P46.21 million. We also undertook the repair and maintenance of 1,524 city streets together with the painting of pedestrian lanes, maintenance of street lights, drainage systems, street signs and center islands.

As always, we pursued our commitment to the advancement of learning for our children. To achieve this goal, we undertook the construction, repair and maintenance of 23 High School and 17 Elementary School Buildings costing P12.10 million and P3.80 million, respectively.

On going is the construction of 6 2-storey high school and elementary school buildings with 60 classrooms costing P11.79 million.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance of the private sector, particularly the Filipino Chamber of Commerce and Industry for its contribution in the construction of school buildings in the amount of P200,000.00.

In line with our intensified health protection and medical outreach programs, we completed the improvement and repair of 8 health centers. We also constructed the Quezon City General Hospital perimeter fence and the Barangay San Vicente Lying-in-Clinic at the total cost of P3.41 million.

Concerned with the socio-economic amelioration and moral regeneration of our wayward youth, we improved the venue of our rehabilitation program by reconstructing the Quezon City Molave Youth Hall at the cost of P1.6 million.

To promote the economic progress of the small entrepreneurs, particularly the market vendors, and to increase revenue from our public markets, we reconstructed the Kamuning and Project 4 public markets at a cost of P7.35 million.

We also allocated P2.3 million for the construction of the Parkway Village Concrete Bridge at Barangay Apolonio Samson in coordination and cooperation with the District Office, Ministry of Public Works and Highways, thus providing easier accessibility and facilitating socio-economic interaction with adjacent communities and barangays.

Recognizing the need for the provision of potable water in the depressed communities, we were able to install 22 waterworks projects in various barangays at a cost of P478,136.77.

Likewise, we improved and repaired 55 public buildings and facilities at a total cost of P3.83 million. We also constructed and improved 5 city parks at a total cost of P1.39 million to meet the recreational needs of the general public.

Realizing the importance of the barangays in our grassroots democracy, we assisted them in the implementation of infrastructural development projects, the assistance amounting to P2.68 million taken from local funds.

#### Socio-Economic Development Programs

The city government, amidst economic difficulties, recognizes the importance of a responsive and decisive program to meet headlong the rapid population increase. Over the years, Quezon City has progressively metamorphosed from a veritable wilderness into a fast growing metropolis. With the city's growth as an urban center and hub of commerce and industry, we have anticipated the pressing needs of our residents for more basic services, notably social, economic and environmental upgrading.

Along with the modernization of the City, however, urban problems have increased, specifically the proliferation of squatters and inadequate employment opportunities.

As a remedial measure, we launched Accelerated Settlements Redevelopment program aimed to provide and allocate for the city's poor the possibility and opportunity to own a residential lot and improve their quality of life through self-income generating projects and self-reliant endeavours.

Through social surveys, studies and researches, we have initially implemented this program in 25 depressed areas out of the 33 potential project sites in different non-zonal improvement program areas.

We successfully facilitated the completion of negotiation between landowners and the occupants at Sitio Mendez and Lim Property, Barangay Baesa, adopting the "intercessionist" approach. We established linkage with other areas, and likewise, we incorporated some activities initially planned for implementation under the zonal improvement program.

We have also undertaken or conducted economic surveys for possible establishment of small scale business enterprises.

I believe that economic stability should precede other forms of human development. We accelerated our Manpower Development Program aimed at providing marketable skills for out-of-school youths and unemployed adults in order that they may become self-reliant and productive members of our community. The local Manpower and Youth Development Council, since its inception, has successfully conducted 250 Skills Training Courses in the Barangay with a total of 7,949 graduates.

The city government has pursued a social welfare program designed to improve the quality of life of our people. By providing assistance to families with income generating projects, the Soft Trade Skills Training and Mothercraft activities have so far benefited 5,812 participants.

On responsible parenthood through counselling as an important component of the program, we have resolved 10,225 cases in all barangays.

We continued to focus our attention and care on the less fortunate and socially disadvantaged groups through our Crisis Intervention Service Program. To date, our program has serviced 8,095 families. We have also handled 2,785 cases of mendicats by providing temporary shelter, medical services, transportation assistance, institutionalization, skills training and counselling.

On the other hand, our Community Action Services Program provided medical and dental assistance to 4,470 individuals.

Strengthening the city government organization for socio-economic development, we extensively improved the administration and management of our 9 public markets, setting aside P2.78 million for physical improvement, materials, equipment pool and efficient garbage collection and disposal. By this, we have enhanced economic profitability and provided convenience to both our vendors and consumers.

As a matter of public policy, and because of the renewed campaign for cooperative development undertakings among the market vendors in our public markets, we extended to the 8 duly registered Public Market Vendors and Retailers Credit Cooperatives interest-free, payable in one year, loans of P50,000.00 each, or a total of P400,000.00. With this capital build-up assistance, the Vendors and Retailers Credit Cooperatives of 518 active members have now an aggregate operating capital of P3.14 million.

We have also vigorously battled for the stabilization of prices of prime commodities at levels affordable by our residents by gearing our market development program, not only to our city-owned and operated public markets, but also to privately-owned and operated markets spearheaded by the private market association of Quezon City.

To bolster productivity for the economic development of the city, we have incessantly exerted efforts to attract business to our city. For 1985 alone, we attracted 21,270 new business establishments, while 29,700 renewed their business licenses.

Specific areas have been designated as vending sites for hawkers. As you very well know, we have to avoid the economic displacement of our people as long as the law and existing government policies are not violated.

The barangays, on the other hand, have implemented P2.49 million worth of socio-economic development projects.

#### Education and Culture

The city government has continuously supported the educational programs of the Division of City Schools. For this 1985-1986 school year, our secondary schools have a total enrolment of 66,074 students, representing a 2.89 percent increase over that of the 1984-1985 school enrolment.

Regarding the student development program, the Division of City Schools has implemented peer teaching methods, remedial classes, intensive instruction and supervision of both elementary and high school students, enabling the achievement levels in all subject areas to improve by 2 percent.

Moreover, in order to infuse new vigor and develop leadership among our student population, curricular and extra-curricular activities promoting character build-up and value formation were undertaken. The city government has encouraged the formation of student clubs and organizations, as well as their participation in constructive endeavors.

Modern educational skills and techniques prompted us to try the scientific discovery approach in the teaching process. We, therefore, added more lessons on development of basic skills and offered academic and vocational electives to our students.

Furthermore, we focused our attention on the improvement of the book-pupil ratio through the acquisition of textbooks and workbooks for our elementary schools.

Not only in-school-youths are taken care of by the Q.C. government. The out-of-school youths have their non-formal education classes in both the elementary and the secondary schools in all parts of the city. In the elementary schools, there are 21 non-formal education centers and one vocational high school which is the Roces Vocational Education Fund was paid as honoraria to the teachers involved.

A total of 900 out-of-school youths benefited from our non-formal education program. The sum of P588,000.00 from the Special Education Fund was paid as honoraria to the teachers involved.

We have also recognized the need to professionalize our teaching staff in order to upgrade their teaching competencies. Towards this end, during the past year, we conducted summer institutes, workshops, seminars and professional meetings and gave, as an incentive, scholarship awards to deserving teachers for their outstanding performance.

The city government, as a compassionate institution, has always been supportive of the cause of teachers in both elementary and high schools.

Although the maintenance of our elementary schools is a national responsibility, we have provided the additional amount of P240.00 to the monthly salary of elementary school supervisors to put them at par with their high school counterparts and also provided for their additional retirement benefits. Aside from the increase in salary and retirement benefits, we extended assistance for their communication, water, light, power and printing services and provided equipment for vocational education at a total cost of P2.14 million.

We were able to increase the teachers' monthly cost of living allowance from P300.00 to P400.00, and extended the city's counterpart of P950.00 for their salary clothing allowance, additional P200.00 incentive pay and P400.00 rice allowance.

I need not mention our firm support and assistance to the high school teachers as their economic welfare has always been provided for in our budgets.

In pursuance of our commitment towards the upgrading of our communities through linkages with school projects, we have promoted community participation in our school activities, notably agricultural projects, livelihood, beautification and cleanliness programs.

To preserve and perpetuate our rich cultural heritage, we undertook last year, through the Cultural and Tourism Affairs Office, a total of 22 cultural activities. These activities included "patugsawit," painting, beauty and motto contest, "santacruzán," physical fitness activities and fiestas in the city's different barangays.

#### Health Protection and Medical Services

The city government, in pursuance of its primordial duty to safeguard the health of its residents, continued to take positive steps towards the proper discharge of this duty.

Through the City Health Department, we continued to undertake various outreach programs, foremost of which is the Maternal Health Care Program. Under this program, 58,154 mothers were given prenatal and post-natal care. We also provided birth delivery Services to 4,325 clients and organized mothers' classes for 1,947 participants.

We likewise paid utmost attention to the health of our children protecting them particularly from common pediatric diseases. Under our Operation Timbang and Supplemental Feeding Programs, 71,973 children in the depressed communities were benefited. We also intensified our "under six clinic program," servicing a total of 33,989 children. This program is a relatively new approach in monitoring the health conditions and situations of the children.

We intensified health protection services and measures for our people. The vigorous implementation of our Communicable Disease Control and Disease Surveillance and Healthful Living Programs resulted in the immunization of 157,227 persons, treatment of 28,283 Tuberculosis case, giving of oral diarrheal treatment to 5,024 patients, extension of preventive medical assistance to 14,198 cases and the holding of training seminars on healthful living for 188,169 participants.

Complementing our medical services, we rendered dental services to 371,775 patients and attended to 8,765 mental cases.

The city government, in its strong desire to protect its youth population from the evils of drugs, has maintained the Quezon City Drug Abuse Council through the office of the Honorable Vice Mayor. The council, during the period under review, attended to 5,563 drug abusers and conducted 63 informational and educational campaigns. Through an inter-agency collaboration scheme, we were able to effect the involvement of 1,000 youth participants in preventive education and community information programs on drug abuse in which we distributed 865 kits. Also, 352 voluntary surrenderees presented themselves for rehabilitation and treatment.

The Quezon City General Hospital, a 250-bed Tertiary Regional Training and Teaching Hospital, has done an exceptionally fine job in caring for our residents, especially the indigent population. For 1985, it treated 11,138 patients and 76,337 out-patients. We have maintained our Satellite Medical Clinic at Barangay Bahay Toro where we served 9,770 patients and attended to 1,892 domiciliary cases.

We provided new hospital services on physical therapy and rehabilitation which benefited 71 in-patients and 132 out-patients. The Mental Hygiene Clinic under the Community Ambulatory Health Care Services provided guidance and counselling as a medical back-up service for drug dependents.

#### Youth and Sports Development

The city government encourages sports activities to promote physical fitness for the people.

Our Physical Development Program is implemented through the barangays, schools, organizations and other sectoral groups through constructive athletic competitions in all levels.

We launched 273 different sports activities last year including the "Takbuan Clinics," unisex aerobic dancing, road races, cycling, volleyball clinics, and breakdancing contests. Hopefully, all these may bring about better health for our people.

In addition, we also undertook different sports programs for our younger set. We initiated the free swimming lessons project, swimming contest, chess tournaments, volleyball and badminton clinics, benefiting a total of 5,500 participants.

Under our Integrated Sports and Physical Fitness Program, we were able to train 1,002 youth participants, in cooperation with the private sector, in the promotion of basketball as one of our major sports activity thrusts during their summer vacation.

#### Protective Services and Adjudication

The city government has maintained judicial, protective and adjudication agencies to ensure and promote public safety, protection of life and property, enforcement of laws and maintenance of peace and order.

In 1985, we contributed financial assistance in the amount of P47.10 million to the Integrated National Police to underwrite the cost of the administrative and operation needs of the police force.

On the fire protection and prevention, the city government has maintained sixteen fire sub-stations which operate 22 modern water tanker-pumpers with sophisticated fire equipment and gadgetry. During the period under review, we extended assistance for the repair and renovation of sub-stations and for other operational expenses in the amount of P1,022,400.00, while we realized P1.82 million from fees accruing from fire safety inspections.

Regarding judicial processes, the Metropolitan Trial Court reported that it disposed a total of 15,595 cases substantially reducing by 219 cases a backlog of cases since 1984. It attended to 791 parolees and processed contracts for marriage, court clearances, court certifications and collected fines, all of which amounted to P236,375.46.

On the other hand, the City Attorney's office acted on 308 referrals for opinions on questions of law out of a total of 694 referrals it received. Furthermore, it reviewed a total of 25 contracts and filed 1,251 cases in different courts for the city government. It also handled a total of 203 cases involving land registration and administrative matters and 3,330 collection cases. All of which resulted in the collection of fees from errant parties, amounting to P2.77 million.

The City Fiscals Office attended to 17,794 cases of which 17,591 cases were filed at the Regional and Metropolitan Trial Courts while the rest were dropped after preliminary investigation. It also issued a total of 8,927 court clearances and 3,030 court certifications.

With regards to appeals for review of real property valuation, the Board of Assessment Appeals received 319 cases and decided 131 of them.

## STATE . . .

In response to public clamor for speedy action on individual and/or group problems and predicaments encountered while transacting business at City Hall, we created the Public Assistance Unit under the Office of the City Secretary. This new unit attended to 54 cases referring them to concerned offices or agencies. It also monitored 42,294 cases involving direct administrative assistance to people needing said assistance.

During the past year, we witnessed achievements in the realm of barangay justice through mediation and arbitration pursuant to Presidential Decree 1508, otherwise known as the Katarungan Pambarangay Law. Nine hundred nine (909) cases were heard of which 244 were conciliated, 5 arbitrated and 128 were issued certification to file action in court or the proper government agency.

## General Administration and Management

With the view of providing opportunity for self-advancement to our officials and employees, including the Barangay Officials we conducted during 1985 several administrative, organizational and management training courses with emphasis on developmental program planning and performance evaluation. We focused our goals towards the development of an attitude that is truly responsive to the needs of our people by upholding the true essence of "Public Office as a Public Trust."

In recognition of the loyal and dedicated service rendered by the officials and employees of the city government, we implemented the Longevity Service Award. There were 596 awardees: 7 gold medalists for 40 years of service; 132 silver medalists for 30 years of service; and 457 bronze medalists for 20 years of service. We will continue giving yearly awards to all deserving officials and employees of the city government.

The degree and magnitude of our achievements has to be sustained and pushed forward with renewed vigor and dedication in order to attain our objectives and thereby savor the fruits of our labor.

## Projections for 1986

As we chart newer and bolder visions for 1986, we will strive to pursue our developmental goals and objectives with greater zeal and determination, discovering in the process our strengths and weaknesses in meeting the ever-burgeoning needs of our people.

With a more determined and intensified tax collection drive, we expect to realize an income of P472.4 million. Of this amount, an infrastructure fund of P59.2 million will be allocated for the construction and improvement of roads, school buildings and health centers.

We shall strengthen the operational capability of the Quezon City Police Force in the maintenance of peace and order by providing 11 additional patrol cars and communication facilities at an estimated cost of P2.66 million. This will be apart from the P48,985,463.00 representing our 18 percent yearly contribution to the Integrated National Police.

We shall endeavor to implement the land for the landless program by subdividing city owned properties into lots to be sold at minimal cost to the actual and qualified occupants.

We shall expand our outreach "Gamutan sa Barangay" project, particularly in the depressed communities, where the health of the people is of paramount importance in our humanist perspective.

We shall work for increase in salaries and continue the grant of scholarships as well as the grant of medical and dental allowances to our employees and teachers. Unforeseen developments have disrupted our timetable for the employees housing program. But we are determined to implement the program this year.

We shall pursue the granting of scholarships to indigent but deserving youth in our city.

We shall encourage the continuous training of Barangay and Katabatang Barangay Officials, the barangay brigades, Lupon Tagapamayapa of the Katarungan Pambarangay law, the pook leader, the members of the Balikatan Ladies Councils and the lay leader with emphasis on livelihood undertakings through self-reliance and individual initiative.

We shall augment our capability in the collection of refuse and garbage in our public markets by providing dump trucks with the necessary personnel complement. On the other hand, we shall provide full support and assistance to the privately-owned and operated public markets in order to improve their sanitary condition.

We shall embark on the improvement of cemetery services and the modernization of cemetery facilities under our Cemetery Renewal and Expansion program. Likewise, the development and improvement of turned-over open spaces in the different subdivisions of the city into recreational areas, shall be given greater emphasis.

We shall exert greater efforts in alleviating the plight of tricycle drivers and operators in our city for we visualize their alleviation as a pilot project to be coordinated with the Metropolitan Manila Commission and the Land Transportation Commission.

Our firm support and assistance to the judiciary, the prosecution arm of justice and to other national offices, shall be given greater impetus as the city government's enduring contribution towards nation building.

And, above all, we shall pursue with determination courage and integrity the translation of our socio-economic, cultural, and political development efforts into the "City of Man," as the Crowning glory of our human endeavors.

## Acknowledgment

In our ever strengthening determination to search for brighter and farther horizons through the implementation of our plans and programs, let us stand firm and resolute, believing strongly in God and in the humanity of man. 3:28 p.m. — "x x x whoever will tangka on him (PFM) will never happen x x x."

4:00 p.m. — "x x x if you will ask about the length of his life (PFM), your Pangulo, you won't be answered for I haven't selected anyone to replace him, for he will look after the law of man and I, MINE. During these days, I'll show you and make you hear your Pangulo. I'll visit him and cure him so as to prove to those judgmental people (ang nagnanasa) will be frustrated.
