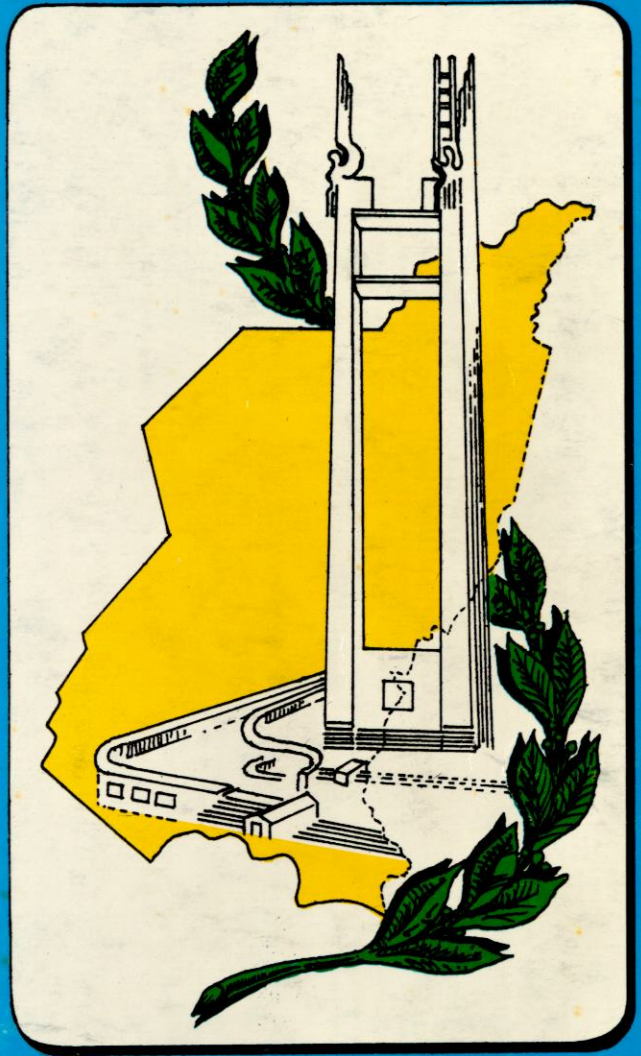

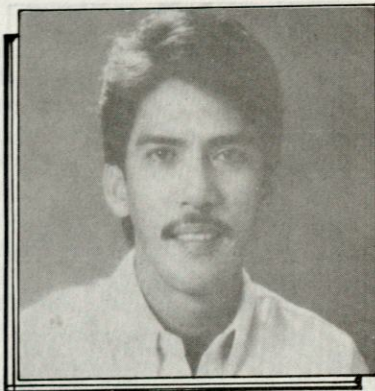

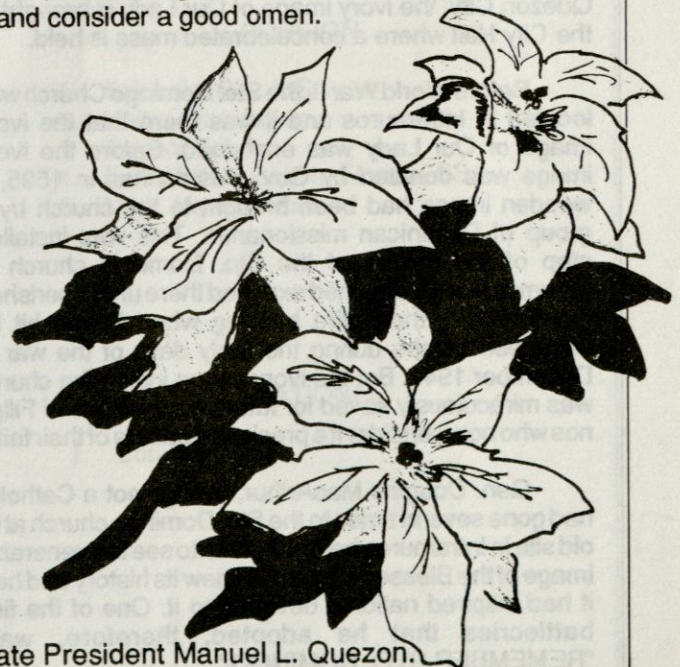
The QUEZON MEMORIAL MONUMENT depicts three vertical structures representing Luzon, Visayas, Mindanao. THE STAR symbolizes the greatness of the late President, THE GAVEL represents his incomparable leadership, THE LAMP represents the educational progress which has made our beloved City the seat of higher learning. The words "LUNGSOD QUEZON, REPUBLICA NG PILIPINAS" are circumscribed around the three sides of the seal. The color scheme carries that of the National Flag. The Official launching of the seal was held during the celebration of Quezon City Foundation Day, October 12, 1974.

HERALDRY DESCRIPTION OF THE SEAL OF QUEZON CITY

"An equilateral triangle divided azure and gules superimpose the silhouette of the Quezon Memorial Monument argent with the lamp of Knowledge argent over the azure field dexter and gravel argent over the field of gules sinister. On the apex of the triangle are three mullets or over a border argent."

"The text LUNGSOD QUEZON and REPUBLICA NG PILIPINAS complete the border arms." To help the layman understand the above heraldic description of the Quezon City coat-of-arms, the dictionary meaning of the technical terms used are given below:

- azure - of the heraldic color blue.
- gules - of the heraldic color red.
- argent - the silver of a coat-of-arms represented in a drawing or engraving by a plain white surface, symbolical of purity, beauty, etc. silvery white; resembling silver, bright silver.
- dexter - appearing or facing forward the right and consider a good omen.
- sinister - to or toward the left.
- mullet - in heraldry, a star of five points or more



Named after the wife of the founder of the City, the late President Manuel L. Quezon.

PATRONESS OF QUEZON CITY



OUR LADY QUEEN OF THE MOST HOLY ROSARY OF "LA NAVAL"

In Resolution No. 9645, S-73 enacted on August 21, 1973, the erstwhile City Council adopted our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary of "La Naval" as the Patroness of Quezon City. The adoption was subsequently approved by the Vatican. The ivory image of Our Lady, a gift of Governor Luiz Perez Dasmariñas in 1595, is enshrined at the National Shrine of the Rosary in Sto. Domingo Church.

Every year on October 12, Foundation Day of Quezon City, the ivory image of Our Lady is brought to the City Hall where a concelebrated mass is held.

Before World War II, the Sto. Domingo Church was located in Intramuros and it was there that the ivory image of Our Lady was enshrined. Before the ivory image was donated by Gov. Dasmariñas in 1595, a wooden image had been brought to the church by a group of Dominican missionaries. This was installed atop of the facade of the Sto. Domingo church in Intramuros and remained exposed there until it perished together with the entire building when it was hit by Japanese bombs during the early days of the war in December 1941. But the ivory image inside the church was miraculously saved for future generations of Filipinos who now consider it a precious treasure of their faith.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, though not a Catholic, had gone several times to the Sto. Domingo church at its old site in Intramuros before the war to see the venerable image of the Blessed Virgin. He knew its history and how it had inspired national devotion to it. One of the first battlecries that he adopted, therefore, was: "REMEMBER STO. DOMINGO."

HEROINE OF QUEZON CITY



MELCHORA AQUINO (Tandang Sora)
January 6, 1812 – March 2, 1919

Though she was already 86 years old at the time Andres Bonifacio and his Katipuneros raised the "Cry of Pugad Lawin" on August 23, 1896, Tandang Sora played an active role in the Philippine Revolution. She provided food and shelter for Bonifacio and his men. She nursed those who were wounded in the battles against the Spanish soldier.

On August 29, 1896, Tandang Sora was arrested by the Spanish authorities and charged with the crime of giving aid and comfort to the Filipino rebels. She steadfastly refused to reveal the hideout of Bonifacio and his men. She was deported to Guam where she lived in exile for six years until, on Feb. 26, 1903 already under the American regime, she was shipped back to the Philippines.

She was officially adopted "Heroine of Quezon City" by a resolution of the City Council. She died at the ripe old age of 107 on March 12, 1919.

HISTORICAL GLIMPSES

- 1939 - National Assembly enacted Commonwealth Act. No. 502 on Oct. 12, 1939 creating Quezon City
- 1942 - upon the outbreak of World War II in the Philippines, Executive Order No. 400 dated January 2, 1942, created Greater Manila which include the City of Manila, Quezon City, San Juan, Makati, Mandaluyong, Pasay and Parañaque.
- 1946 - Republic Act No. 54 enacted Oct. 10, 1946 which repealed Executive Order No. 400.
- 1946 - Republic Act No. 333 - established Quezon City as the capital of the Philippines and the permanent seat the National Government;
- 1947 - Construction of the Old City Hall in EDSA at the cost of ₱125, 130.00;
- 1949 - Republic Act No. 392 enacted on June 18, 1949, changed the boundaries of the city and declared its area to be 15,359 hectares, thus making Quezon City one of the largest cities in the world in point of area
- 1949 to 1951 - Construction of the Roxas housing project; consisting of 1,014 units occupying an area of 39.5 hectares;
- 1950 - Republic Act No. 537 known as the revised charter of Quezon City was, enacted
- 1951 - Construction of Quirino Project 2 housing project consisting of 1,014 units in an area of 38 hectares; to
- 1953 - Construction of the Quirino Project 3 housing project consisting of 1,226 housing units in an area of 38 hectares;
- June 6, 1952 - Barrio Talipapa was renamed Tandang Sora in honor of the "Mother of Pugad Lawin";
- 1954 - Construction of Project 4 housing project consisting of 3,039 housing unit in an area of 92.5 hectares;
- 1959 - Republic Act No. 2259 - The highest official of Quezon City became elective;
- 1976 - Presidential Decree No. 940 - deprived Quezon City to its distinction as the capital of the Philippines. The distinction was returned to the City of Manila;
- 1988 - Republic Act No. 6636 - resetting the local election from November 9, 1987 to January 18, 1988, amending Executive Order No. 270.
- March 4, 1988 - Executive Order No. 319 provides for the reorganization of the Local Development Council.

SIGNIFICANT EVENTS THAT HAPPENED IN QUEZON CITY

- 1896 August 23 - Bonifacio and his men tore their cedula at Pugad Lawin and started the Filipino revolution against Spain;
- 1897 December 14 - the first Pact of Biak-na-Bato was signed;
- 1897 December 15 - signing of the second Pact of the Biak-na-Bato;
- 1972 - The 1971 Constitutional Convention was drafted and signed in Quezon City Hall;
- 1981 - March 15 - Ramon Magsaysay, Cubao High School, Q.C. Public Library, Cubao Branch, Comelec Branch Office and Fire Department Offices were gutted by fire;
- 1981 June 5 - Quezon City Police Station building in EDSA was razed by fire;
- 1985 February 22-26 - EDSA Revolution raged through "PEOPLE POWER";
- 1987 August 28 - Coup Attempt, Renegade soldier headed by Col. Gringo Honasan attacked Broadcast City and Channel 4 ABS/CBN in Quezon City.

QUEZON CITY PLACES OF INTEREST AND LANDMARKS:

- AMORANTO STADIUM** – This was inaugurated in 1966. The stadium was named after Mayor Amoranto. The handsome athletic stadium was constructed on 5.8 hectares land along Roces Avenue. The complex consists of a grandstand, and eight lane track and field oval, bleachers, and a gymnasium, it was built at a cost of P2 million. Since then it has been the scene of many important national local wide athletic events.
- ARANETA COLISEUM** – the biggest domed Coliseum in the world, with a seating capacity of 36,000. Scene of many international sports events like Ali-Frazier title fight in October 1975. Utilized as venue for the Holiday on Ice and Miss Asia Quest.
- LUNG CENTER OF THE PHILIPPINES** – Quezon Avenue, Q.C. – It was inaugurated on January 23, 1982. The hospital provides special care for lung disease.
- MARYKNOLL COLLEGE** (now known as Miriam College) – Katipunan Road, Q.C. – It was opened in 1952. It is in twenty hectare property and is the first catholic women's university in the Philippines. Maryknoll College was changed to Miriam College effective March, 1988, in response to the church call for the leaders-practice in evangelization, regarding Vatican II. There was a turn over, that was way back 1975, to a lay board of trustees, this was a response to Vatican II's emphasis on promoting more active involvement of the laity in the mission of the church as well as the Filipinization of Schools and impending termination of the Langley Agreement.
- NATIONAL KIDNEY INSTITUTE** – (Formerly National Kidney Foundation of the Philippines). It was inaugurated on January 16, 1981. On November, 1986 it was changed to National Kidney Institute. This hospital has the modern equipment and facilities for kidney operation including kidney transplant. It is in Quezon Avenue, Q.C.
- NINOY AQUINO PARK** – (Formerly Parks and Wildlife). Quezon Avenue, O.C. It was put up on July 5, 1954 in an eighty hectare land complex of wooden areas for picnicking and leisurely rambling place. There is a children's playground and a manmade lagoon for boating. Specimen of the country's fauna and flora, including monkey eating-eagle, can be seen here. On March 1986 it was named after the late Senator Benigno S. Aquino.
- PHILIPPINE CHILDREN'S MEDICAL CENTER** – (Formerly Lungsod ng Kabataan Children's Hospital). A children's hospital that doesn't look like one. It exudes the atmosphere of a playground or a romping room. Storybooks and cartoon character are splashed in attractive colors in murals that fill the walls of corridors or wards. It was established on April 20, 1982.
- PHILIPPINE HEART CENTER FOR ASIA** – East Avenue, Q.C. – It was launched on February 7, 1972. This hospital has the latest facilities, equipment, techniques in the care and treatment of heart illnesses. Heart specialists from all over the world meet here periodically for exchange and sharing of cardiac vascular knowledge.
- QUEZON CITY HALL** – A 14 storey edifice, built in 1964 during the term of late Mayor Norberto S. Amoranto. It was designed by Ruperto Gaité, constructed by Weldon Construction under the supervision of the Quezon City Engineers Office and it was inaugurated on January 1, 1972. It acquired historical significance when the 1971 Constitutional Convention, transferred its venue on August 3, 1972, from the Manila Hotel to the top three floors of the QC Hall. Beautifully landscaped premises featuring a Sunken Garden, a man-made lagoon and an orchids garden. In the year 1981, a one-half hour fire gutted the three story left wing of the QC Hall destroying property worth P10 million. On June 11, 1988 another fire razed the QC Hall building from the 7th to 14th floors, causing property damage estimated at P240 million.
- QUEZON INSTITUTE** – E. Rodriguez Sr. Avenue, QC – A hospital for those afflicted with Tuberculosis. It was established on August 18, 1938 in memory of the late President Manuel L. Quezon who was himself a victim of Tuberculosis.

QUEZON MEMORIAL CIRCLE – Elliptical Road, QC – A twenty-six hectare land dedicated to the first Philippine President of the Commonwealth after the independence. At present the circle is dominated by the towering tri-pillared Quezon Monument and the museum of Quezon's remains in whose underground chambers are housed the Quezon City Museum and Art Gallery.

RADIO VERITAS – Fairview Park, QC – It is run by the Catholic hierarchy in the Philippines whose broadcasts are heard practically all over the world because of its powerful transmitters.

SAN PEDRO BAUTISTA CHURCH – San Francisco Del Monte, QC - It is the second oldest church in the Philippines built in 1699 and renovated in 1932. Its 16th century parish priest Father Pedro de Bautista, has been canonized and the church now bears his name. His bones are buried in the church and parts of the old altar still exists.

ATENEO DE MANILA UNIVERSITY – Loyola Heights, QC. This was established in 1958 in a ten hectare land. It is said to be the school for the elite and formerly an exclusive school for the boys.

ATOMIC REACTOR – Don Mariano Marcos Avenue, QC. This was built on July 16, 1958. It is shaped like the half of an egg. This structure is the only one of its kind in the country which signifies the country's involvement in the atomic age.

ALI MALL II – Araneta Center, Cubao QC. Different department stores are located in this complex selling imported articles or products which became an instant hit to the city's shoppers.

BATASANG PAMBANSA – Constitution Hills, QC. It was completely finished on March, 1978, to house the national parliament. It is now the seat of the government where congressmen or representatives hold their regular sessions. The building stands on a picturesque site with a breathtaking backdrop of mountains and valleys. It has spacious hallways and foyers.

CENTRAL BANK OF THE PHILIPPINES – East Avenue QC. The complex is composed of five interconnected buildings with a total floor area of around 62,210 sq.m. built on a land area of 57,300 sq. m. The Security Plant Complex consists of three departments namely: The Security Printing Plant (SPP) Mint and Gold Refinery and the Office of the Gen. Services. It was inaugurated on September 7, 1978.

CLOVERLEAF MARKET – Balintawak, QC. Gateway to Metro Manila from the North, the cloverleaf or the Balintawak transmission Complex; was formerly thought to be the site of the "First Cry of Balintawak" the celebrated Bonifacio Monument which had been at the UP Campus until it was found out that said First Cry was at Pugad Lawin.

FARMERS'S PLAZA – Araneta Center, Cubao QC . One of the biggest market places in the city, owned and managed by a private group of companies. After it was razed by fire three years ago it was reconstructed and it is now operational.

FIESTA CARNIVAL – Also located at Araneta Center, Cubao, QC – It provides different amusements, recreational and entertainment facilities.

LA MESA DAM – Novaliches QC – A source of water supply for the Metro Manila. Wooded areas around the dam makes it a paradise for picknickers and campers.

SANTO DOMINGO CHURCH – Quezon Avenue, QC. This is one of the biggest and oldest churches in the Philippines. It is the shrine of the celebrated Our Lady of the Holy Rosary whose feast is in October 12. From the University of Santo Tomas it was transferred to Quezon City at a total cost of P3 million pesos. Mayor Amoranto inaugurated the church on October 10, 1954.

UNIVERSITY OF THE PHILIPPINES – Diliman, QC – It was opened in 1948, lies on a four hundred ninety three (493) hectares campus. In educational standard, it is one of the Asia's leading institutions. Students from all over the world, are enrolled in UP and alumni of the school have become leaders in our country.

WELCOME ARCH – The now familiar "Welcome Rotonda" gateway to Quezon City from Manila and one of the city's popular landmarks. It was designed in 1948 by City Architect Luciano V. Aquino in the office of Mayor Ponciano Bernardo. The total cost of construction was Twenty Five Thousand Pesos (P25,000). The small lions at its base were donated by the Lions Club of Quezon City.

President Manuel L. Quezon left for Corregidor on December 24, 1941. He designated Executive Secretary Jorge B. Vargas on January 1, 1942 as Mayor of Greater Manila - a new political entity comprising Manila, Quezon City, Caloocan, Pasay, San Juan, Mandaluyong, Makati and Paranaque. The Mayors of the units comprising Greater Manila were designated Assistant Mayors.

When Mayor Tomas B. Morato was arrested by the Japanese on July 19, 1942, Quezon City was divided into two districts, Dr. Florencio A. Cruz was appointed District Chief of Diliman and Gregorio Felipe was the District Chief of San Francisco Del Monte.

OUTSTANDING ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF PAST MAYORS

TOMAS B. MORATO — NOVEMBER 5, 1942 - (First Mayor of Q. C.)

Despite very limited funds, he was able to construct a network of roads in accordance with the Frost Master Plan, and despite an inadequate police force of only 48, he was able to contain criminality by going after all kinds of vices on the belief that vice is the father of crime. He caused the eradication of gambling dens, cockpits, cabarets and other social evils in the new city.

PONCIANO A. BERNARDO — JANUARY 1, 1947 - APRIL 28, 1949

In 1940 President Quezon appointed him as Vice Mayor and City Engineer of Quezon City. In addition to these two positions he was also a member of the Board of Examiners for Civil Engineers.

Among his outstanding accomplishments were construction of the Old City Hall now Ramon Magsaysay High School at a total cost of P156,772.48; Bernardo Park - a park-carved out of a hill at a total cost of P19,000.00; Galas market at a total cost of P25,000.00; Quezon City High School for young students who previously had to go to Manila to get their secondary education; established the Quezon City Public Library; more policemen were hired to combat the proliferation of crimes.

It was during his term that R. A. 333 making Quezon City "The National Capital of the Philippines and the permanent seat of the National Government" was approved by President Quirino on July 17, 1948.

R.A. 333 appropriated funds for the acquisition of private estates within the boundary limits of the city and authorized the issuance of bonds of the National Government for the construction of streets, bridges, waterworks, sewerage and other municipal improvements in the new city.

Mayor Bernardo did not see all these plans materialize. On April 29, 1949 he was ambushed in Quezon Province with Doña Aurora Quezon and others.

NICANOR R. ROXAS — MAY 4, 1949 - JANUARY 6, 1950

Although he had a very short term of only eight (8) months, it was significant because Quezon City became the national focus of development. The inauguration of Quezon City as the national capital of the Philippines was held on October 22, 1949 with the laying of the cornerstone at the Constitutional Hills. He was the Philippine Ambassador to Benelux Countries (Belgium, Netherlands & Luxemburg) when he died on March 12, 1971.

IGNACIO SANTOS DIAZ — JANUARY 6, 1950 - DECEMBER 30, 1953

He was born as "The Builder". He worked for the revision of Commonwealth Act No. 502 known as the Charter of Quezon City to Republic Act No. 537 which was signed into law by President Quirino on June 16, 1950. This law extended the boundaries of the city, increasing its area from its initial 1,527 hectares in 1939 to 15,359 hectares. It also increased the number of councilors from three to eight. Among his greatest accomplishments were the transfer of Police Headquarters from Roces Avenue to the then Doña Aurora Hall located at its present site; establishment of the City Jail at its present site; purchase of jeeps for the mobile patrol bureau for Quezon City and for the entire country; construction of the left and right wing of the Old City Hall; construction of Kamuning and Murphy markets; construction of the La Loma Fire Station; construction of Cubao Health Center, Balara Health Center; organized the League of Barrio Lieutenants now Barangay Captains, to assist police in the peace and order drive; construction of numerous police outposts in Novaliches, New Manila, Sta. Mesa Heights, Balintawak, Cubao, Frisco and La Loma and construction of boundary markers in EDSA, Sociego (Sta. Mesa), La Loma, Novaliches and Balintawak to determine and pinpoint area of responsibility; and made Novaliches as the industrial zone of the city.

NORBERTO S. AMORANTO — JANUARY 1, 1954 - MARCH 31, 1976

Served the longest term as Q. C. Mayor. A fiscal expert, he studied the financial condition of the city as soon as he assumed office; he encouraged more business establishments to move to QC by giving them attractive tax incentives. Intensive tax collection drive resulted in the increase of revenues by 300 percent. As a consequence roads were improved, more policemen were hired, radio police cars were purchased, modern dump trucks were bought for garbage collection, free education from grade school to highschool was given. Among his greatest achievements were: codification of all tax ordinances increased revenues, improvement of public school buildings, health centers and public markets, building of roads and bridges, construction of parks and playgrounds, improvement in the efficiency and morale of the police department and general expansion of the city services. Some of

the roads constructed were Kamiyas-Anonas Road, 2.11 kilometers, at a total cost of P177,935; Novaliches-Ipo Avenue, 14.130 kilometers, at a total cost of P1.8 million; acquired and operated an Asphalt Plant (a Bituminous concrete mix) operated a self-liquidating basis; construction of QC Hall at a total cost of P18 million; Amoranto Stadium at a total cost of P2 million; beautification and land development in front of the QC Hall at a total cost of P1.5 million, where a Sunken Garden was put up, lights installed, curbs and gutters built, increased number of school districts from 12 to 15 and high schools from 5 to 11, elementary teachers increased from 669 to 2,591 and high school teachers increased from 98 to 1,145.

Mayor Amoranto fulfilled the dream of President Quezon to give QC residents hospitals, schools, parks, shopping centers, theaters, entertainment complexes, good garbage collection, clean streets and well-lighted thoroughfares. He was likened to Emperor Augustus who "found Rome a city of bricks and left it a city of marble".

He died of heart attack on December 22, 1979.

ADELINA S. RODRIGUEZ — APRIL 1, 1976 - APRIL 13, 1986

First lady Mayor; she was often cited for her barangay and social power projects. Among her vital achievements were: comprehensive development program; manpower development program, infrastructure constructions; slum improvement, barangay, educational, health improvement; cleanliness and beautification; industrial, commercial improvement and government organizational development; "Palagiang Paglingap sa mga Mamamayan" program; walk-in-skills training center of the Quezon City Council of Women to involve more women in civic projects. Implementation of the KKK program wherein the poorest of the poor were able to start a livelihood projects; establishment of the QC Kabuhayan Technological Center; installation of public faucets, artesian wells and deep wells particularly in depressed areas and places not covered by MWSS; construction of the QC Public Library main building; complete reconstruction of the Roxas District Library; establishment of branch libraries in barangays Del Monte and Masagana; also the restoration and development of the QC Museum in coordination with the National Historical Institute; and the Quezon City Museum housed at the QC Memorial Shrine.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF QC GOVERNMENT UNDER MAYOR JUN SIMON

CITY REVENUES:

- the city's revenues increased by an average 7-10% from (1971 to 1986)
- the city's revenues increased by 32% from 1987 to 1988
- the city's revenues increased from P399 million in 1986 to P446 million in 1987, an increase of 47 million
- the city's revenues increased from P446 million in 1987 to P643 million in 1988, an increase of P200 million.

HOUSING:

- 90 out of the total 549 houses have already been constructed the initial phase of the Manresa Redevelopment Program.
- 40,000 units of houses are expected to be completed by the end of 1992.
- 5,000 units of houses are being programmed for completion by the end of the year.

LIVELIHOOD:

- mini-industrial estate was initiated to generate an estimated 30,000 to 50,000 new jobs primarily to Q. C. residents.
- the Quezon City Filipino-Chinese Businessmen Association was formed to explore more business opportunities in Q. C.
- Industrial Relations Office was created to settle problems and disputes in the business community.

CLEANLINESS:

- barangay based-incinerator will be set-up in order to provide easy garbage disposal to the public.
- establishment of "Kariton" project for street children to generate more job opportunities for the less fortunate

MORALITY:

- continuous raids on business establishments showing lewd shows and those exhibiting indecent acts.

CIVIL SERVICE:

- Reorganization of city government for better public service.

BEAUTIFICATION:

- The creation of Quezon City Parks Development Foundation under Charito Planas to start the long process of beautifying Quezon City and its environment.
- a total of P22 million was allotted for the QCPDF and another 3M revolving capital was given by the Department of Tourism.

HEALTH:

- preventive and curative medicine will be pursued.
- setting-up of additional mobile clinic to better serve the public.
- 24 hour health centers will be maintained to provide round the clock protection to every constituents.
- the construction of a 150-bed satellite hospital in San Bartolome, Novaliches
- the establishment of a "botikang-generic" projects will be explored to provide cheaper medicines to the public.

PEACE AND ORDER:

- initiated the purchase of 30 additional mobile patrol cars to enhance police mobility around Q. C.
- initiated the purchase of 600 pistols and 100 shotguns for the use of the Q. C. Police.
- initiated the construction of a new Q.C. city jail
- initiated the creation of a central police district to cover Q. C. exclusively.

EDUCATION:

- creation of Q.C. Polytechnic University wherein students will be trained on skills needed by local firms.
- establishment of 3 more satellite public libraries and purchase of books amounting to P1.2m for the reading public.

The City Mayor, the Chief Executive of the city government shall exercise such powers, duties and functions as provided in the Local Government Code and other laws; he shall maintain peace and order in the city, and in pursuance thereof, he shall be entitled to possess and carry the necessary firearms within its territorial jurisdiction, subject to existing rules and regulations on the possession and carrying of firearms; prepare and submit to the Sangguniang Panlungsod the annual budget of the city for the ensuing calendar year on the date and in the manner provided and prescribed by law; see to it that executive officers and employees of the city faithfully discharge their respective duties, and for the purpose, cause, if necessary, the institution and filing of appropriate criminal or administrative action; examine the books, records, and papers of all offices, officers, agents or employees of the city, represent the city in its business transactions, and signs all warrants drawn on the city treasury and all bonds, contracts and obligations of the city; as soon as possible but not later than March 31 of each year, prepare and submit to the Ministry of Local Government an annual report covering the operation of the city government during the preceding calendar year; ensure that all taxes and other revenues of the city are collected, and the city funds applied in accordance with law or ordinance to the payment and settlement of the city expenses and obligations; take such emergency measures as may be necessary to protect the public from, fires and other public calamities, grant or refuse to grant, pursuant to law, city licenses or permits, and revoke the same for violation of law or ordinance or the conditions upon which they are granted; initiate appropriate action or proceedings against any national government official or employee rendering service within the city to draw the attention of the corresponding superior officer to the dereliction of the official or employee involved; direct the preparation and formulation of the development plan and program of the city, and upon approval by the Sangguniang Panlungsod, direct and supervise the implementation and execution of the same; call a meeting of any or all of the officers and employees of the city.

The Quezon City Public Library was organized in 1948 through the vision and foresight of the late Mayor Ponciano Bernardo. Quezon City then, was in its feverish stage of development, the war years having stopped temporarily the development that was started by the late Pres. Manuel L. Quezon.

Role of the library:

CIVIL REGISTRY OFFICE

With the enactment of the Civil Registry Law (Act 3753) approved on November 26, 1930 and took effect on November 27, 1931, civil registration was made compulsory.

The City Civil Registrar shall be responsible for the civil registration program in the city. He shall: accept all registrable documents including judicial decrees affecting the civil status of persons; file keep and preserve in a secure place the books required by law and transcribe and enter immediately upon receipt all registrable documents and judicial decrees affecting the civil status of persons in the appropriate civil registry book; transmit to the office of the civil registered documents required by law; issue certified transcripts or copies of any certificate of registered document upon payment of the prescribed fees to the city treasurer; receive applications for issuance of marriage license and, after determining that the requirements including supporting certificates and publication thereof for the prescribed period have been complied with, issue the license upon payment of the authorized fee to the city treasurer, collaborate with census officers of the National Census and Statistics Office in conducting educational campaign for vital registration and assist in the preparation of demographic and other statistics for the city.

BUSINESS PERMITS AND LICENSE OFFICE

This Office was created pursuant to and furtherance of the provisions of Sec. 10 item (N) of RA No. 537 an Act to revise the charter of Quezon City, which states:

This Office issues and renews business, occupational and special permits, conducts investigation, verification and inspection on business operations. Acts on all complaints against operation of business establishments and files cases for delinquency/deficiencies and operating without permit and license against operators of business establishments operating in this City.

To be able to hasten the issuance of permits expeditiously and to provide convenience to the taxpaying public, this Office has adopted and implemented the One-Stop/Fast Processing System for business and occupational permits. With this System, all the representatives from the different technical departments involved in the issuance of business permit (eg. the Fire Department, the City Health Officer, the City Building Official and the City Treasurer) are detailed in this Office to facilitate and expedite processing of application for Mayor's permit. TRICYCLE REGULATION UNIT

GENERAL FUNCTIONS:

The Tricycle Regulation Unit shall perform the following duties and functions: conduct and maintain an inventory of all motorized tricycles operating as public transport; study, develop and recommend to the City Mayor the tricycle routes, maximum number of tricycles to operate in each route, color scheme for each route; receive and process all applications and recommend to the city Mayor the issuance of franchise to operators of motorized tricycles; investigate and recommend the suspension, cancellation or revocation of any tricycle franchise for violation of tricycle service rules and regulations; assist in the supervision and control of the operation of motorized tricycles in the city; assist different tricycle associations in their affairs; receive and resolve complaints filed by the riding public; coordinate with other Tricycle Regulation Units in Metro Manila; and causes the apprehension of colorum tricycles by requesting assistance from different government agencies tasked to assist and support the activities of the City Government.

OFFICE OF THE CITY ASSESSOR

The functions and duties of the Assessor are provided in Section 89 of PD 464, as amended.

The City Assessor shall: establish a systematic method of assessment in the manner prescribed herein and in accordance with rules and regulations issued by the Secretary of Finance; install and maintain a real property identification and accounting system conforming to the standards prescribed by the Secretary of Finance; prepare, install and maintain a system of tax mapping showing graphically all properties subject to assessment in his city and gather all necessary data concerning the same; make frequent physical surveys to check and determine whether all real property within the locality are properly listed in the assessment rolls; appraise all items of real property at current market value in accordance with real property tax code; keep a records of all tranfers, leases, and mortgages of real property, rentals, insurance, and cost of construction of buildings and other improvements on land, and land income for assessment purposes; apply uniformly the assessment levels fixed in Section 20 hereof to the current market value of all property subject to assessment; cancel all of the assessments, in case several assessments are made for the same property, except the one property made, but if any assessee or his representative shall object to the cancellation of the assessment made in his name, such assessment shall not be cancelled but the fact shall be noted on the tax declaration and assessment rolls and other property books of record; eliminate from the assessment roll of taxable property such properties which have been destroyed or which, being exempt, have been improperly included in the same; decrease the assessment where the property previously assessed has suffered a permanent loss of value by reason of storm, flood, fire or other calamity; and increase the assessment where improvement have been made upon the property subsequent to the last assessment.

QUEZON CITY GENERAL HOSPITAL

The idea of a Quezon City General Hospital was conceived by Mayor Norberto S. Amoranto in 1963. In 1966, Mayor Amoranto, Vice Mayor Sta. Romana, Councilors Paredes, Mison, Bermudez, Lucasan, Lapuz, Orendain, Benitez and Sebastian opted to purchase for the city government a 14.7 hectares lot in Seminary Road EDSA, Quezon City which was the San Jose Seminary. In August 16, 1968 the hospital was opened by virtue of City Ordinance No. 7555 series in 1968 with an appropriation of P110,962 for operation and maintenance and P271,620 for salaries of 73 personnel. RA 6548, "an act further amending RA 573 as amended otherwise known as Rev. Charter of QC" was approved and elevated the Quezon City General Hospital as one of the City Departments.

The Quezon city General Hospital has the following functions: improve the standard of patients care, complete service facilities; upgrade plant facilities and equipment and improve hospital staffing pattern and their skills as a requirement for a tertiary Regional Hospital; provide a high quality medical care both in-patient and outpatients and primary health care to residents of Quezon City and suburbs, especially the indigents; provide an adequate number of competent professional, technical staff and auxilliary personnel necessary to support and maintain a 300-bed teaching and training hospital, and at the same time to comply with the staffing requirement of the Ministry of Health; provide and upgrade adequate diagnostic, therapeutic facilities and physical physical plant in order to conform with the minimum standard requirement for efficient patient care.

OFFICE OF THE CITY ATTORNEY

The following are the duties and responsibilities of the City Attorney as provided for under Section 28 of Republic Act No. 537, as amended.

The City Attorney shall: represent the city in all civil cases wherein the city or any officer thereof in his official capacity is a party; attend, when required by a resolution of the city Council, draw ordinances, contracts, bonds, leases and other documents involving any interest of the City, meetings of the City Council, and inspect and pass upon all such documents already drawn; give his opinion in writing when requested by the Mayor or Council, upon any question relating to the city, or the rights, or duties of any City officer; he shall, whenever, it is brought to his knowledge that any city officer or employee is guilty of neglect or misconduct in office, or that any person, firm or corporation holding or exercising any franchise or public privilege from the City has failed to comply with any condition, or to pay any consideration mentioned in the grant of such franchise or privilege, investigate the same and report to the Mayor; he shall, when directed by the Mayor, institute and prosecute in the city's interest a suit on any bond, lease or other contract, and upon any breach or violation thereof; he shall prosecute and defend all civil actions related to or connected with any city office or interest; he shall also have charge of the prosecution of all crimes, misdemeanors, and violations of the city ordinances, in the Court, of First Instance and the municipal courts of the city, and shall discharge all the duties in respect to the criminal prosecutions enjoined by law upon provincial fiscals; he shall cause to be investigated all charges of crimes, misdemeanors, and violations of ordinances, and have the necessary information or complaints prepared or made against the persons accused, and perform other duties as may be prescribed by law or ordinance.

GENERAL SERVICES OFFICE

In compliance with BP bldg. No. 337, then City Mayor Adelina S. Rodrigues issued Executive Order No. 5, dated March 1, 1985, creating the office of the General Services. This Order effected the transfer of supervision and control of the Property and Supply division from the Office of the City Treasurer to the Office of the City General Services Office. As stipulated under BP No. 337, the functional scope and jurisdiction of supply, are focused mainly on procurement, storage, disposal.

On January 12, 1987, then OIC, Brigido R. Simon, Jr. issued Executive Order NO. 2 consolidation/merging the Building maintenance Section with Parks and Playgrounds Division (Then both of the Department of Engineering and Mayor's Office) with the General Services Office. The Metro Manila Commission (MMC) however, recommended that these be two (2) separate divisions (just as how it recommended splitting of the supply and property divisions into two (2) distinct divisions)

On October 22, 1987, the MMC recommended the formal constitution of the Quezon City General Services Office.

The General Services Office shall: advise the City Mayor and the other city officials and employees on matters relative to general services management; develop and prepare plans, programs and activities relative to general services in coordination with other city departments or office heads for submission to the Sangguniang Panlungsod through the City Mayor; implement laws, and the rules, regulations, standards and policies by the Sangguniang Panlungsod to promote the economical, efficient, effective management of general services of the city government; administer the properties of the city government relative to their acquisition, storage, delivery utilization, maintenance and disposal; perform supply and property procurement and maintenance function, including non-personal services of the city government, and such other general activities as the exigency of the service: take custody of and be accountable for all properties real or personal, owned by the city government; perform all other functions pertaining to supply and property management.

QUEZON CITY FIRE DEPARTMENT

Quezon City Fire Station has four (4) Divisions namely:

OPERATIONS DIVISION — it has for its main function the actual fire suppression operation in case of fire occurrence. There are 18 sub-Fire Stations under this Division. These 18 Sub-Fire Stations are strategically located in

various areas of Quezon City with an objective of 5 minute response time frame in case of a fire alarm.

ADMINISTRATIVE BRANCH — it shall, among others, be responsible in providing the Station Commander (Chief of Fire Department) with staff advise and assistance in budget and finance, personnel management improvement and other administrative matters.

ELECTRICAL DIVISION — this division is responsible for enforcement of laws, city ordinances and standard electrical regulations, and practices governing electrical engineering and exercises supervision over placing, stringing, attaching, and installation of telegraph, telephone, installations, light poles and other electrical apparatus.

SERVICES BRANCH — this is responsible for providing the station with well-planned directed and coordinated services relating to supply and maintenance and communication services.

ELECTRICAL DIVISION

The Electrical Division has the following functions: responsible for the enforcement of laws, city ordinances and standard electrical regulations and practices governing electrical engineering; supervises the activities of the electrical personnel, serves as consultant of the QC Government in matters relating to electrical engineering, exercise supervision over placing, stringing, attaching and construction of telegraph, telephone installations, light poles and other electrical apparatus. The Senior Electrical Engineer under general supervision, supervises and participates in the performance of electrical engineering work or in power surveys undertaken by a number of electrical engineers, inspectors/electricians. The inspection section, directs, controls and supervises activities of a group of electrical inspectors such as investigation and inspections of electrical installations in building, establishment/residential houses to insure compliance to existing laws, ordinances; advice contractors and building owners and keep records of reports and inspections. The Record Sections serve the entire electrical office on matters concerning the use, storage and disposition of operating records, takes charge in reservation, maintenance and retirement of records.

OFFICE OF THE VICE-MAYOR

The Vice-Mayor may exercise executive functions as may be assigned or delegated to him by the City Mayor aside from the legislative functions he is empowered to perform as presiding officer of the Sangguniang Panglungsod. He shall exercise the powers, duties and functions of the City Mayor in case of temporary incapacity of the latter to perform his duties on account of physical or legal causes, or when he is on official leave of absence or on travel outside the territorial jurisdiction of the Republic of the Philippines, except the power to appoint, suspend or dismiss employees for a period corresponding to the temporary incapacity of the incumbent, or corresponding to the incumbent's official leave of absence or travel abroad, or for a period of not more than three months.

The Vice Mayor shall have the following functions, in addition to those provided in Executive Order No. 80-02.

Assume the Office of the City Mayor in the event of permanent and temporary vacancy as provided under the local Government Code; supervise and coordinate the sports, and cultural development programs of the city; coordinate and monitor the implementation of national government projects and services including public works and road-and-bridge programs in the locality; initiate upon approval of the Mayor appropriate action or proceedings against any national government official or employees rendering service within the city to draw the attention of the corresponding superior officer to the dereliction of duty of the official or employee involved; act as chairman of the city anti-drug abuse committee; sit as member in the local school board and peace and order council; advise and assist the Mayor in the formulation of development objectives and policies for the city; recommend to the Mayor such emergency measures as may be necessary to protect the people from fires, prevent and mitigate the effect of floods, storms, earthquake and other public calamities; recommend to the Mayor such measures as may be

necessary to safeguard all the lands, buildings, records, monies, credit, and other property rights of the city; and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Commission and/or Mayor from time to time.

METROPOLITAN TRIAL COURTS

(City Courts)

(Batas Pambansa Blg. 129)

Territorial jurisdiction of courts. Metropolitan trial courts, municipal trial courts and municipal circuit trial courts shall exercise their jurisdiction in the city, municipality or circuit for which the judge thereof is appointed or designated. Procedure in the Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts: Uniform with that in regional trial courts. - Rules 5 and 123 of the Rules of Court are hereby repealed. The procedure to be observed in metropolitan trial courts, municipal trial courts and municipal circuit trial courts, in all cases and proceedings, whether civil or criminal, shall be the same as that to be observed in the regional trial courts. Jurisdiction in ejectment cases. - Metropolitan trial courts, municipal trial courts, and municipal circuit trial courts, without distinction, may try cases of forcible entry and detainer even if the question of ownership is raised in the pleadings and the question of possession could not be resolved without deciding the issue of ownership, but the question of ownership shall be resolved only to determine the issue of possession.

REGISTER OF DEEDS

(Note: Occupied 10th floor of QC Hall. Transferred to National Housing Authority after June 12, 1988 fire)

All instruments relative to lands, the recording of which is required or allowed by law, are recorded and registered by the Register of Deeds in proper form. He is authorized by law to make memorials affecting titles to lands as well as to enter and issue new certificates of title with the corresponding duplicates thereof. The duties of the

Register of Deeds are purely ministerial in the sense that he has no power to pass upon the veracity of the recitals of a deed presented to him for registration, even if said deed is required by law to be presented, filed and registered, because that function peculiarly lies within the province of the courts of justice. It is his ministerial duty to record without any material alteration such instruments as are law entitled to be recorded.

BUREAU OF INTERNAL REVENUE

The Bureau of Internal Revenue Collection Agent's Office for Quezon City Hall is divided into two (2) sectors, the north and the south. As the collecting arm of the BIR, its main purpose is to accept payments of all kinds of Internal Revenue Taxes except: (a) capital gains (b) documentary stamp for deed of sales and (c) estate and gift taxes. Payments are accepted by the Regional Office of Quezon City because they require prior approval of the Revenue District Officers before payment.

In this office, the essential requirement of a taxpayer is the presentation of revenue tax returns which are the basic source documents for the preparation of payment orders. The actual preparation of payment order takes one (1) minute or less. After which, the taxpayer presents this payment order to the bank for the actual payment and in return, the bank prepares the corresponding confirmation receipt.


MAP OF QUEZON CITY



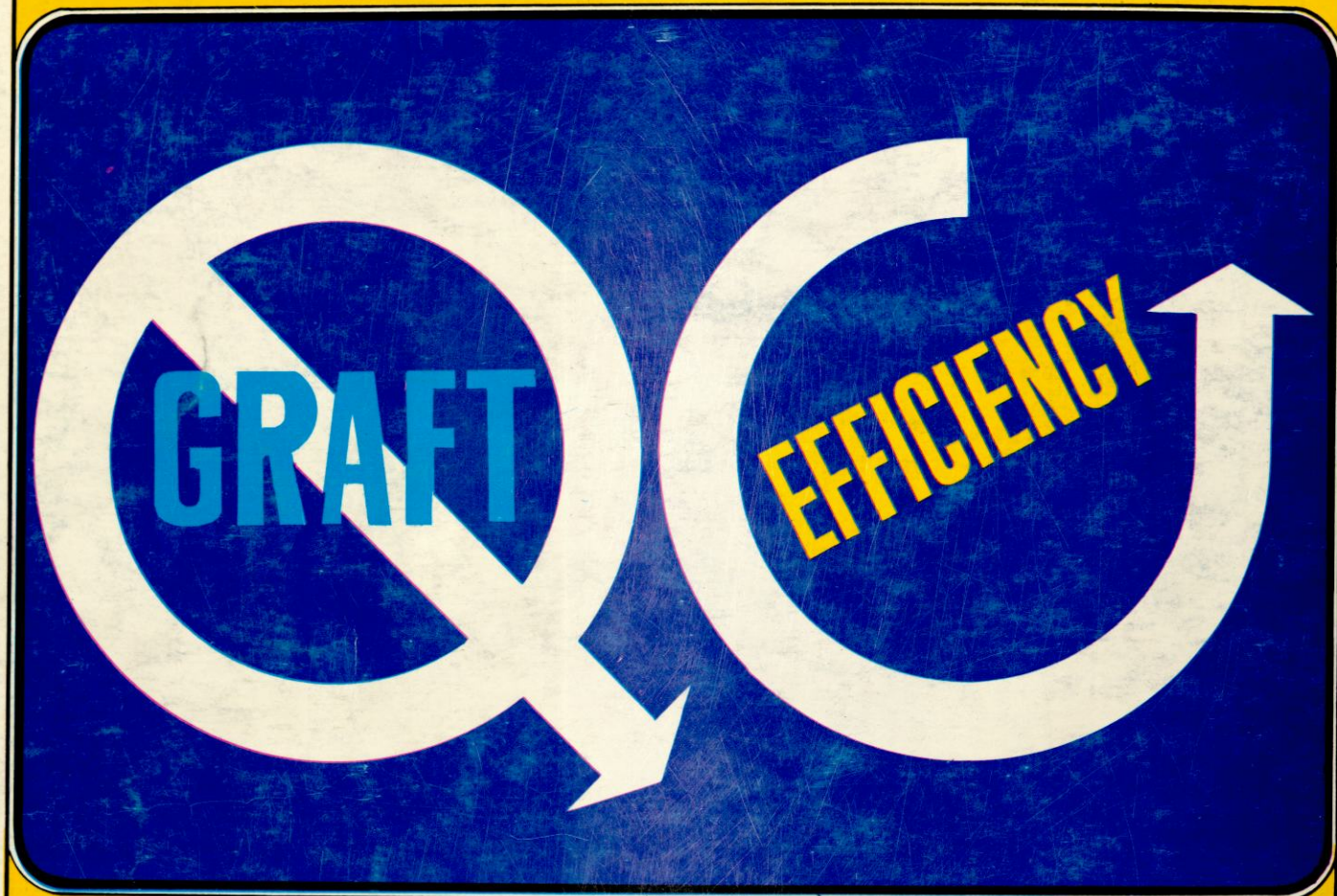
